
The Medford Woodmen are an industrious bunch and they permit nothing to slacken their progressive work and the present roundup of candidates is the result of their efforts in that direction.

who have been on strike in Berlin since November 22, today abandoned the unsuccessful struggle.

The leaders advised the workers to return to their employment for the present on the old terms, recommending them to renew their demands later when a more favorable opportunity presented.

PARLIAMENT QUILTS AFTER LONG SESSION

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Parliament adjourned today after enacting the

most important legislation in recent years—the vote bill, restricting the power of the house of lords to kill popular measures, and the industrial insurance bill, championed by Chancellor David Lloyd-George.

The 1912 session of parliament will begin February 14.


