Cooke, the Oakland aviator, today enjoys the distinction of being the first birdman ever to fly over Mount Tamalpais in an aeroplane. He soared over the peak 1000 feet above its summit. Communications. Smith's Water Suit. W. M. (Tennessee) Smith today addressed the following communication to the Mail Tribune outlining his position in the injunction suit he has brought against the city, in order to force the city to reduce its monthly water rental for his apartment house on South Riverside. To the Editor: "The facts in regard to the water case are these: There are not 30 families housed in the building now, nor ever were at any one time. The building has averaged about half full. "This hotup water gang first assessed me \$135 a quarter, or \$45 per month, or \$540 per year. I backed, then they came again and assessed me \$90 a quarter. I backed.
