

### SHUSTER FORCED TO RESIGN POST TOWARD OFF WAR

Show of Arms by Russia Proves Successful—Both Russians and Persians Sustain Heavy Losses in First Battle.

TEHERAN, Dec. 22.—Despite popular protests the Persian parliament dismissed Treasurer General Shuster in the midst of great excitement caused by the news that Russian Cossacks had bombarded the governor's palace at Tabriz and had seized the police headquarters at Resht.

Anti-Russian demonstrations of the most violent nature are proceeding here and the streets are thronged with mobs demanding armed resistance to the advance of the Russians. Persons suspected of pro-Russian tendencies are being hourly attacked, and the police are unable to quell the rioting.

Reports from Tabriz say that both the Russians and the Persians have suffered many casualties and that fighting in the outlying sections of the city is still in progress.

In addition to ousting Shuster, it is reported that Persia has submitted to every Russian demand.

While no official announcement has been made, it is believed a new treasurer general of Persia will be secured from the United States or some European country, but the government cannot act definitely in this regard until Russia and Great Britain confirm the appointment.

Shuster has said he would be satisfied to withdraw if parliament were convinced that it was necessary to the welfare of Persia. When the decision to dispense with his further services was reached, a parliament messenger carried the notice to Shuster. The latter replied with his resignation and thanked parliament for its support.

The public has not yet learned of Shuster's dismissal. If, when they do learn of it, the present disorders increase, Russian troops probably will be rushed here to quell any outbreaks.
