J. Pierpont Morgan, the well known financier and art collector, has just come into possession of five beautiful Gobelin tapestries, which he bought from the king of Spain through a New York art collector.

The tapestries are from the Manufactures Royale des Gobelins. Their borders, which are of unusual width, are of the exquisite Rose du Barry and are embellished by garlands of flowers.

In the first panel, "Don Quixote Attended by the Duchess' Women," the hero is seen in the center. He is extravagantly dressed. The ladies of the duchess are bestowing all manner of attentions upon him. One holds a mirror before him and another girls on his sword. As for Sancho, who has not yet retired behind the door where he may have a quiet gobble, he is making himself agreeable to the fair members of the court. A terrace and park are shown through an archway in the background and a window is on the left. The tapestry is signed, "Cozette, 1773."

The governor suggested a solution for the problem—an all-state free employment agency to keep record of all positions open in every locality.
