

GAYLORD WILL SPEAK TONIGHT

Socialist Member of Wisconsin State Senate Will Address Local People on the Subject of "Municipal Business" at the Natatorium.

Winfield R. Gaylord, socialist member of the state senate of Wisconsin, will address the people of Medford this evening at the Natatorium hall on "Municipal Business." Mr. Gaylord is one of the most prominent members of the socialist party in the United States and no doubt will have much of interest to say to local people. He has just passed through the campaign at Los Angeles where he was sent to answer questions regarding the success of socialists are said to be meeting with at Milwaukee, where they control the city government. All are invited to attend, admission being free.

ALLEGED DYNAMITERS PLACED ON TRIAL

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 4.—After waiting more than six months in the Los Angeles county jail Bert H. Conners, Ira F. Bender and A. P. Maple, labor leaders charged with conspiracy to dynamite the Hall of Records here, were brought to trial today.

It was learned shortly after the session opened that separate indictments had been returned by the grand jury, whereupon separate trials were ordered. Maple and Bender will go to trial officially Monday, with Conners to follow.

In an effort to compel a statement of specific charges upon which the men will be tried, Attorney Lecompte Davis, who is conducting the defense, interposed a demurrer to the indictments. The motion, however, was overruled and the selection of a jury begun.

BRYAN EXPRESSES HIS VIEWS ON CONFESSION

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 4.—Expressions of William J. Bryan's opinions in the McNamara cases are set forth today in the current issue of his periodical, the Commoner. It says:

"The McNamara confessions have given enemies of union labor a chance to label all connected with organized efforts to protect the wage earners. The same men who are indignant whenever the sins of 'sweatshops' owners are charged against all manufacturers; when the crimes of the trust magnates are imputed in business; when the vices of Napoleons of finance are laid at the door of bankers in general, are hastening to hurl broadsides of libel at all who are forced to earn their bread by the sweat of their brows.

"This is manifestly unfair. Organized labor has learned a lesson. It will be more careful in the future selection of leaders. Society may well pause and inquire if anything is wrong with conditions which lead men into dastardly conspiracies against life and property."

TARIFF BOARD HAS IMPOSSIBLE TASK

So Declares Woodrow Wilson and Thereby Strikes Popular Chord—Bryan Expected to Announce His Campaign Policy Soon.

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—The assertion by Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey that President Taft has set an impossible task for his tariff board struck a popular chord here and added impetus to his boom for the democratic presidential nomination is seen today. Governor Wilson's criticism of the president was made while speaking before the National Democratic club.

William J. Bryan has arrived at Tampa, Fla., and it is expected that he will announce his campaign policy at the Jackson day dinner next week. Politicians here believe that President Taft is certain to get the support of the New York delegation in the national convention, provided he consents to "talk business" with William Barnes, Jr., chairman of the state republican committee. Otto Bannard, one of President Taft's strongest supporters, announced today that he expected to confer with Barnes at an early date, and this is generally construed here to mean that the New York leader will soon announce his intention of throwing his support to Taft.

JOLIET, Ill., Jan. 4.—Senator Robert M. La Follette arrived in Joliet from Chicago today sick. Oysters eaten in the Windy City artfully poisoned him and he felt poorly. Interstate Commerce Commissioner Franklin K. Lane May Be Appointed by Taft as a Compromise Candidate Instead of Hook.

Lane of California for the associate justiceship of the United States supreme court is the rumor here today following a conference that officials had with President Taft. It is believed the president is considering Lane as a compromise candidate since the opposition to Justice Hook of Kansas developed.

Lane could have the support of the progressives, and it is known that the president considers him one of the ablest lawyers in the country.

Richeson, charged with the murder of Miss Avis Linnell, that his condition is still improving, it appeared probable today that the minister will be unable to go to trial January 15. An intimate friend of the accused man who visited the jail declared that Richeson is a physical and mental wreck.

FOUR FREEZE TO DEATH IN KANSAS

Blizzard Prevails in Western Kansas—Slight Snow Fell Last Evening in Iowa and Eastern Kansas Colder in South Dakota.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 4.—Dispatches from Ness City, Kan., today state that four persons were frozen to death in the blizzard that has swept western Kansas for the last three days. Three of the deaths occurred at Ness City, the fourth victim being a cattle man on the ranges. A slight snow fell last night in Iowa and eastern Kansas, tempering the intense cold. South Dakota, however, registered a drop in temperature. At Huron, S. D., the mercury dropped to 34 degrees below zero.
