PACKERS' TRIAL AGAIN UNDER WAY AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—The trial of J. Ogden Armour and nine other millionaire packers, charged with violation of the Sherman anti-trust law was resumed here. Arthur Colby, assistant secretary and treasurer of the National Packing company and a director since its formation in 1902, was summoned by the government.

He testified that he knew nothing of the operations of the National company aside from the financial end. After naming the 13 subsidiaries operating under the company and identifying the company's minute books, he was excused.

JAIL IS SCENE OF PANIC WHEN FIRE STARTS

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 5.—Fire which started in the women's quarters of the provincial jail today gutted that part of the building and caused about 100 prisoners to become panic-stricken. The fire was got under control before it reached the men's quarters, although at one time it was thought that all the prisoners would have to be taken out of the building.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY CAMERON TO FACE RECALL FIGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Enough names have now been secured for placing the recall of District Attorney Cameron on the ballot, according to Councilman James Maguire, who has been directing the work of circulating the petitions.

The citations charge Cameron with incompetency among other things. "I have not decided just when to file the recall petition with the secretary of state, but my plan is to hold it and have it placed on the ballot in the primary election in April," said Maguire.

BANDITS HOLD UP SANTA FE TRAIN KILL MESSENGER, SECURE \$100,000

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 5.—Bandits held up a Santa Fe train near Mojave, Cal., this afternoon, secured \$100,000 and escaped after killing an express messenger. Such is an unconfirmed report reaching Los Angeles this afternoon.

CRACKSMEN MAKE SUCCESSFUL RAID

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Entering the front street wholesale liquor house of H. B. Varwig by cutting a hole through the rear wall of the building and then removing a heavy iron door leading to the front part of the store, cracksmen blew the safe early today and escaped with approximately \$200 in cash. The robbery was discovered when the fire department was called out to extinguish a small blaze started by the thieves in an adjoining second hand store which they had entered and stolen blankets to muffle the explosion.

Two cracksmen known to be in the city are suspected.

ENGLISH MONARCHS SEE MAGNIFICENT PAGEANT

CALCUTTA, Jan. 5.—King George and Queen Mary today witnessed the magnificent Calcutta pageant, representing historical Indian scenes dealing with the times when native rulers ruled and fought to please themselves. Frank Laeelles, who ran the Hudson river pageant, produced the spectacle. Native princes, their elephants, horses, arms, costumes and jewels were the big feature of the display. The procession, which finished this afternoon, was two and a half miles long. A special law had to be passed to permit the show, which will be repeated tomorrow. Six thousand actors participated, and more than 200 gorgeously commissioned elephants paraded past the royal pavilion.

MISTAKEN FOR LION; FRIEND SHOTS HIM

FRESNO, Cal., Jan. 5.—Charles Parker is at the county hospital today with a gunshot wound in the neck as a result of being mistaken for a mountain lion by one of his friends. With the wound threatening death, he was carried through the Sierras for three days and nights to medical aid. He has a chance of recovery.

SMALL PRISONER HAS HIGH TIME IN CORRIDOR

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Because he had a habit of squeezing through the bars of the city jail and talking exercise in the corridors, C. D. Williams, four feet five inches high, weighing 90 pounds, is confined in a special cell of heavy wire netting today.

Williams was jailed on the complaint of a 180 pound logger whom the diminutive pugilist whipped and for punching Patrolman Thatcher, one of the biggest men on the force, in the eye when Thatcher arrested him.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 5.—Because prospective customers were frightened away, A. Block, an expressman, petitioned to have his license number changed from "2313" to "010." Permission granted.

Politics His Undoing.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 5.—Alleging that he paid too much attention to politics, the public service commission has removed A. W. Perley, state track inspector. His assistant, G. O. Bernhardt of Spokane, has also been asked to resign.

JOHN BERG, WRESTLER, TO INVADE THE WEST

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—An invasion of the middle west is planned by John Berg, claimant to the world's light heavyweight wrestling championship. Berg expects to swing eastward in the middle of February, prepared to defend his claim against any and all in his division. Berg says he does not expect that Demetral, from whom he won the title by defeating him here recently, will return to Portland for a second bout.

READY TO RESUME WARFARE IN CHINA

NANKING, Jan. 5.—With the armistice terminating tomorrow, republican troops this afternoon began ferrying a large quantity of rolling stock across the river to Pukow, preparatory to renewing hostilities. Reinforcements of 4000 rebel troops from Canton, who brought with them 30,000 new magazine rifles, arrived today. The republican forces now total 30,000.

Sefrou Attacked.

TANGIER, Morocco, Jan. 5.—A wireless dispatch today states that a force of revolting Moroccan tribesmen attacked the town of Sefrou, but were repulsed, leaving 50 dead on the field after eight hours of terrific fighting. The garrison, commanded by French officers, lost five killed and fifteen wounded.
