ORDINANCE NO. 647.

An ordinance assessing the property adjacent to and benefited by the following:

Section 1. Whereas, the City Council did heretofore provide by ordinance for the construction of a lateral sewer six inches in size, constructed on alley between Euclid avenue and East Main street, through block 2, Conroy-Clancy subdivision, the cost of constructing the same and providing therefor to be assessed against the property benefited by the same and show cause, if any, why said property should not be assessed for the same and the amount thereof to be fixed a time for hearing any such protests, which notice was given in accordance with said ordinance more than ten days before the beginning of the construction of said sewer, but no protests were filed with the city clerk within ten days from the date of the publication of the ordinance and this notice three times in the Medford Mail Tribune, pursuant to an order of the city council of said city.

And it is hereby ordered that the assessment declared by the foregoing ordinance has been made and the lien therefor entered in the city lien docket, and that the same is due and you are hereby required to pay the same to the city recorder within ten days from the date of the publication of this notice and the foregoing ordinance three times in the Medford Mail Tribune, pursuant to an order of the city council of said city.
