THOMASON IS TURNED LOOSE

Man Charged With Assault and Highway Robbery Is Freed by Justice Taylor—It May Have Been Some Other Person.

The outcome of the assault and robbery case heard in Judge Taylor's court Friday afternoon was acquittal for the defendant.

Andrew Swatzel had caused the arrest of Dick Thomason, charging him with assault and robbery on the Medford-Central Point road Thursday night.

Jess Thomason, a brother of the defendant, swore that both the plaintiff and defendant were at his house in Central Point late Thursday night and that his brother, the defendant, did not return to Medford with the plaintiff, but remained at his house, and that Swatzel had no marks of violence on his face when he left for Medford. The conclusion of the judge was that if Swatzel had been assaulted it was by some person other than Thomason.
