TWO SUSPECTS ARE ARRESTED

Authorities Believe They Have Men Who Robbed the Oregon Express Last Friday Morning Near Redding, Cal.

RED BLUFF, Cal., Jan. 8.—Two men—D. F. Baldwin of Chico, Cal., and another named Smith—are under arrest here today in connection with the robbery of the Oregon Express last Friday morning. According to postal inspectors, who made the arrest, both men answer in a general way the description of the bandit given by Mail Clerk Charles J. Rhein. The man giving his name as Smith is not known here, but Baldwin is known slightly. He came here a few days ago from Chico with his wife.

To postal authorities in San Francisco Rhein said the bandit looked like a consumptive, although his pale and greatly emaciated appearance might have been caused by the use of drugs.

SLAYER OF BABE FALLS DOWN IN FIT

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Jan. 8.—John Reeh, on trial charged with having murdered his new born babe, fell to the floor, apparently in a fit, today while the court was taking the testimony of Dr. G. V. Hamilton, a Chicago alienist, who is devoting his time to the care of Stanley McCornick, son of the late Cyrus McCornick.

Women in the courtroom screamed and rushed for the doors. During the panic the sheriff and two deputies battled desperately with Reeh, and it was only after five minutes of furious struggling that he was subdued.

Dr. Hamilton testified that he examined Reeh before the death of the baby and that he then believed him insane. He stated that he still holds this belief.

The case is expected to go to the jury tomorrow.

TRAIN SERVICE OVER O. W. R. & N. BLOCKED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 8.—Train service east over the O. W. R. & N. is completely blocked this afternoon by snow which has accumulated in the gorges of the Columbia river, despite the 48-hour battle waged by railroad employes to keep the tracks clear. A few trains got through during the forenoon before the huge drifts blocked the lines again.

It is expected that normal service will not be resumed for at least 24 hours.

Similar conditions obtain on the North bank road, which runs on the north side of the Columbia river.

Service between Portland and Seattle and Portland and San Francisco is about normal.
