

"DRYS" DEMAND FOUR CHANGES

Anti-Saloon League Rallying Forces for Coming Fight—Four Propositions Are to Be Basis of This Year's Battle.

PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—A letter is being issued today by the Anti-Saloon league of the state to every clergyman in Oregon, and many others, calling them to united action and specifying four things that the league claims need immediate action. These four propositions are stated in the following letter:

"First, congressional action correcting the abuse that has grown up in shipping liquor into dry territory under the protection of the interstate commerce law.

"Second, an amend the state constitution that it will be impossible to have a wet city in a dry county. The 'home rule' amendment and recent decisions of the supreme court make this imperative.

"Third, the selection of a legislature that is friendly, that adequate legislation can be expected, and unfriendly legislation defeated.

"Fourth, the enforcement of law, through personal effort and also through the election of men for these offices having to do with the interpretation of law who can be depended upon to do their complete duty."

The league will also, it is stated at their headquarters, immediately begin operations to carry their plans into execution by issuing letters to candidates for congress and the United States senate to learn the attitude of these men on the question of the interstate shipment of intoxicating liquors, and then in turn the Anti-Saloon league proposes to advise their friends of such attitude that they may act accordingly. The league leaders declare that they will do similar work in relation to the legislature, namely to learn the attitude of candidates on favorable legislation and join for the ones friendly regardless of party, and oppose all others. They also propose to mix in the election of district attorneys, judges and other officials.

Petitions will soon be in circulation, according to the Anti-Saloon league program, to so amend the constitution by repealing the home rule amendment, that by the constitution a city will be prevented from being wet in a county the majority of the citizens of which are for prohibition.

NATWICK CHARGES OLIVER WITH ASSAULT

C. H. Natwick swore to a complaint this morning in Judge Taylor's court charging John Doe with assault. A warrant of arrest was promptly issued out of this court and the John Doe, who is none other than J. E. Oliver, was brought into court, and gave bonds for an appearance at 3 o'clock this afternoon, when a hearing will be had. Oliver is in the employ of Twoby Bros., and the trouble which lead up to the assault grew out of a dispute over the possession of a barn on Riverside avenue, on which barn both parties in the mixup claim to have a lease, or right of possession. Oliver, the story goes, when he discovered the Natwick horses in the stable, tied them outside, where Natwick later found them. Natwick and a Greek in his employ attempted to again put the stock under cover of the barn, when Oliver put in a protest and with a piece of scantling in hand put both Natwick and the Greek out of commission, and as their evidences of the assault each has a badly battered face. It may be shown at the trial that Oliver was acting in self-defense.

Temperature Rises From 18 to 20 Degrees—Zero Weather, However, Is Expected for Tomorrow—Many Suffer Intensely.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—With the mercury standing at 8 degrees above zero and a light snow falling, the cold wave was broken here, and the distress largely alleviated. Although the temperature has risen from 18 to 20 degrees throughout the middle west and northern states it is feared that zero weather will be experienced again tomorrow. Eight deaths were caused by the blizzard that has ravaged the district during the past few days.

Churches and vacant stores here were heated and opened to the homeless yesterday and all applications for aid immediately granted.

Milwaukee reported five inches of snow with a temperature of 6 degrees above zero.
