

NEW YORK AND LOS ANGELES EACH NAB SUSPECT FOR BANK ROBBERY

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—Charged with the larceny of \$258,000 from the branch of the Bank of Montreal at New Westminster, B. C., which was dynamited September 14, John McNamara of San Francisco, known to detectives throughout the country as "Australian Mack," is in jail here today, having been arrested by central office detectives.

When searched the detectives found \$1100 in McNamara's clothes, and today they are bending their energies to locate \$240,000 more which they believe he has secreted somewhere in New York.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 9.—Suspected of having been concerned in the theft of \$258,000 from the Bank of Montreal branch at New Westminster, B. C., on September 14, Charles Hoffman, whose real name, the police say, is Charles Dean, is under arrest here today awaiting the action of the Canadian authorities.

According to the local agency of the Pinkertons, Hoffman has been trailed from Canada to Mexico and from New York to Los Angeles since the New Westminster robbery. He was arrested, they allege, only after the amassing of sufficient evidence in Canada.

GLOVER IS BOUND OVER TO COURT

E. C. Glover, who was arrested Monday morning charged with assault upon the person of Chris Natwick and Peter Swiler, had a hearing before Judge Flynn O. Taylor, Tuesday afternoon, and after nearly the entire afternoon had been consumed in taking testimony Glover was bound over to the grand jury with bonds placed at \$500.

WOULD PROTECT HORSES AT FRENCH BULLFIGHTS

PARIS, Jan. 9.—Vigorous protest against the killing of horses in the 40 or more annual bullfights held in France is being made by the French League for the Protection of Horses. The league is seeking enforcement of the Grammont law, which demands that horses be protected against the bulls' horns by an armor covering.

Five Children Burn.

MOTLEY, Minn., Jan. 9.—Five children of Irving Carlisle, whose ages ranged from 2 to 14 years, were burned to death in their home here today. Carlisle was badly burned in an attempt to save his children. Mrs. Carlisle is crazed from grief, and her condition is critical.

Duke to Visit Us.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 9.—The duke of Connaught, governor general of Canada and his wife may soon visit the United States. It is declared here today that the British and Dominion governments have exchanged on the proposed visit.

Martial Law Proclaimed.

HELSINGFORS, Jan. 9.—Proclamation of martial law and banishment of all persons suspected of assaults on soldiers in Viborg is threatened by the military commander as a result of the attacks he declares have been made upon his men there.

Expect Balkan Revolt.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 9.—With the Bulgarian and Macedonian revolutionary committees determined to obtain the autonomy of Macedonia, a general revolt in the Balkans is expected.

WILLIAM LORD JR. SUED FOR BREACH OF PROMISE

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9.—A sensational suit was begun here this morning by Lillian Smith, a former Salem girl now in Portland, when she filed a breach of promise suit against William Lord, Jr., a prominent attorney and son of ex-Governor Lord of Oregon. She brings suit for \$25,000.

SEVERAL INJURED WHEN TRAIN HITS SWITCH ENGINE

ERIE, Pa., Jan. 9.—Several persons, according to reports received here, were injured near Dunkirk, N. Y., today, when the engine of the Knickerbocker special, running from St. Louis to Boston on the Lake Shore road, crashed into a switch engine.

DOUKHOBORS TO LOCATE IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 9.—Twelve thousand Doukhobors, followers of the teachings of Tolstoi, are coming to southern California to form an immense colony. They will leave their present homes in Saskatchewan, Canada, within the next few weeks and begin their southern pilgrimage, according to A. P. Cherbak, their agent here.

ABSOLUTE BAN PLACED ON HAWAIIAN FRUITS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 9.—Through publication of the fact that the state board of control had granted to Professor A. J. Cook of the state horticultural commission \$8500 to maintain a quarantine against the Mediterranean fly plague of Hawaii, it was learned today that for eight months past an absolute ban has existed in California against all Hawaiian products. Not only has not a single pound of Hawaiian fruit come to San Francisco or other ports of the state, but the steamers plying between California and Hawaii have been forced to refuse to buy a pound of Hawaiian products of any sort, and have been outfitting entirely in San Francisco for the round trips. Even the baggage of passengers has been rigidly inspected.

The latest "war appropriation" is designed to make the embargo on Hawaiian products absolute until such time as the danger to California's horticultural products shall have passed.

Pressmen Locked Out.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 9.—One hundred members of the pressmen's assistants' union are locked out of the 24 shops of the Franklin Printers association here today as a result of the refusal by nine press feeders in the Myself Rollins and the Union Lithographic company's shops to work while the wages of five of their number are under the union scale. The total weekly amount in dispute is \$4.50. The scale is 16 1/2 cents an hour. The printing trades council takes action on the lockout tonight.

Vicar General Dead.

DUBUQUE, Iowa, Jan. 9.—Monsignor Roger Ryan, aged 75, vicar general of the Catholic arch-diocese of Dubuque, died here today from injuries received in falling on an ice pavement several weeks ago.
