DELGASSE WILL SIT IN CABINET

French Statesman to Return to Power and Become Minister of Marine—Is an Enemy of the Kaiser and Friend of England.

PARIS, Jan. 10.—Virtual defiance to Germany, which for years has been his foe, is seen here today in the assumption of the ministry of foreign affairs by Theophile Delcasse, former minister of marine, who succeeds Minister DeSelves in the foreign office. Admiral Germinet is expected to become minister of marine.

Delcasse's acceptance of the portfolio of foreign affairs marks his first real resumption of power since 1905, when, practically threatened with war by Germany if Delcasse retained his office, the French minister of that day was forced to oust him at the demand of the kaiser.
