A special meeting was held by the Greater Medford club Monday afternoon, when Governor West addressed the club, speaking upon civic improvement and prison reform. The governor told of the work which had been accomplished by women in civic improvement in some of the eastern cities he recently visited, and how women were pre-eminently fitted for work of that kind, and that the men really expected and needed them to help clean up a city and make it beautiful. He spoke particularly of the need of planning for parks and acquiring the land, even if it were not possible to make improvement of it at the present time, as land that could be gotten for a sum now would greatly increase in value in the next few years. He said we should plan for the coming generations and not alone for our present needs and that it was up to the women to keep the subject before the people.

He then spoke of prison reform and told, at some length, of the work he was trying to accomplish along that line, that he was not doing it from a sentimental point of view, as he had been forced to cut expenses to meet the appropriations allowed, and while he always wanted to help the "under dog" he was trying to carry it out along practical lines, and even if there were some failures and broken promises just such failures and broken promises occurred in business life every day. Governor West stated that he did not intend to run for office again, unless forced to by his political enemies, as he was not a "quitter."

Close attention was given to the governor's remarks, which were of great interest to the club, and many people stayed after the meeting to meet him.

The regular meeting of the club will be held January 29.
