THINK THEY HAVE MAN WHO ROBBED TRAIN

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 15.—James Williams, arrested Sunday afternoon by Captain of Police Penning and Detective Ryan, on suspicion that he robbed a mail car of Southern Pacific train No. 16, near Redding, January 5, probably will be confronted with Mail Clerks Rhein, Warner and Heinrich, who were tied in the car by the bandit, in an effort to identify him.

When arrested, Williams had \$400 in stamps on his person and considerable money and checks. Williams answers in every way the description of the man who pointed a revolver at one of the clerks and compelled him to tie his companions and then calmly robbed the car. W. Irvine and James Price, men with police records, were arrested some minutes later. They are companions of Williams.

GOVERNOR INAUGURATED IN FORTY-SEVENTH STATE

SANTA FE, N. M., Jan. 15.—W. C. McDonald, the first governor to be elected by the people of New Mexico, was inaugurated at noon today in the hall of representatives here. Thousands of visitors from every section of the southwest witnessed the ceremonies.

Immediately after the oath was administered there was a military parade, which was viewed by thousands of spectators. The most brilliant affair in connection with the inaugural ceremonies, a reception and ball, will take place tonight in the governor's palace here, which has been the seat of the former territory's government since the Spaniards occupied New Mexico 300 years ago. The palace will be brilliantly illuminated for the occasion.
