SAN FRANCISCO WARS ON I. W. W.

Street Speaker Warned to Exercise More Care and Riot Follows—Campaign Is Taken Up Against Organization.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Jan. 18.—As a result of a riot in which nine policemen were attacked by several hundred Industrial Workers of the World sympathizers, the authorities here have taken up today a campaign against the organization. Several arrests were made.

Wholesale arrests were prevented by the crowd manhandling the officers, who used clubs freely.

Herbert Wright, organizer, was holding a street meeting when the riot was started by the speaker making a disparaging remark about San Francisco women. Corporal Lemon saw women in the audience. He ordered Wright to be more careful in his remarks. Wright, instead, became abusive, the officer charges, and the speaker was ordered from his platform. Then the rioting started and reserves were summoned.

MOTHER JONES TO M'NAMARA AID

"I Pray God to Give Us More Men Like Those Two Boys," She Says Before the State Building Trades Council at Fresno.

FRESNO, Cal., Jan. 18.—Upholding the dynamite activities of John J. and James B. McNamara, now serving sentences in San Quentin penitentiary for their work in southern California, "Mother Jones," aged 80 years, member of the United Mine Workers of America, today went on record before the State Building Trades council convention here with the declaration that union labor should stand by the convicted men.

"There may be some weak-kneed ones among you," she said, "who have cried and howled with the masters against the McNamars. But I pray that God may give us more men like those two boys."

Mother Jones then stated that scores of union coal miners had been murdered in west Pennsylvania under her own eyes and said that many a time she wished she were a man so that she "could have dealt out justice with her own hands."

Queen Wilhelmina's only child is a girl, and if her majesty's illness should prove fatal, the Dutch throne would go to a foreigner.

ASKS COURT TO COMMIT GIRLS

Prosecuting Attorney Mulkey Petitions Judge Neil to Send Minnie and Ethela Fredenburg to Boys and Girls' Aid Society.

Prosecuting Attorney Mulkey on Tuesday filed a petition with County Judge J. R. Neil asking that Minnie Fredenburg, aged 14, and Ethela Fredenburg, aged 16, be committed to the custody of the Boys and Girls' Aid society at Portland, alleging in the petition that they are dependent children.

The matter was called to the attention of the presenting attorney by a women's organization which was perfected in Medford a few weeks ago for the purpose of looking after cases of delinquency and dependency which may be found among the boys and girls of the city.
