Cummins Enters Race. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 20.—Senator Bert Cummins of Iowa today announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for president.

The declaration by the Iowa senator that he was at last in the field as against President Taft and Senator La Follette of Wisconsin caused a tremendous political sensation.

Cummins' candidacy was announced in a direct statement issued today. In it the Iowa said:

"So much has been published in the newspapers and so much has been written and said to me concerning the presidency, that I feel it my duty to make a plain statement to the republicans of Iowa.

"Immediately upon my return from the last session of congress I made a statement of my opinion respecting the presidency. That opinion remains unaltered. The situation, however, is changed, and it now seems probable that more than two candidates will be seriously considered in the national convention.

"Under these conditions, if the republicans of Iowa believe I am fitted to be presented to the convention as a candidate for the presidential nomination and they desire to present me, I will appreciate and accept their confidence as a gratifying evidence of their faith in my promise to serve as best I can the general welfare of the people."
