ALLEGED BANK ROBBER MUST STAY IN JAIL

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—John McNamara, a former San Francisco saloon keeper, under arrest here for alleged complicity in looting the branch Bank of Montreal at New Westminster, B. C., of \$258,000, will have to remain in jail until final disposition of his case is made. This was the ruling today of United States Judge Hugh in dismissing the writ of habeas corpus which Defense Attorney Battle had secured to have McNamara admitted to bail. In dismissing the writ Judge Hugh ordered the authorities to hold the \$800 bond on McNamara at the time of his arrest. The Canadian authorities are completing arrangements for McNamara's extradition to New Westminster, where he probably will be forced to stand trial. The prisoner stoutly protests his innocence of any connection with the bank robbery.

GOVERNMENT WILL OVERLOOK COLLISION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The United States government will not take any action against the Hamburg-American company, whose liner Cleveland damaged the armored cruiser Colorado in a collision yesterday as the vessels were entering the harbor at Honolulu, according to announcement made by the navy department officials here today. The Colorado has been drydocked at Honolulu for repairs to its propeller, which was badly damaged when the vessels came together. The collision was due to the falling dead at the wheel of Pilot Sanders of the Cleveland.

TELEGRAPHIC TABLOIDS.

DETROIT, Mich.—Complete count today of yesterday's balloting in the referendum election showed that the Thompson-Hally streetcar ordinance, granting 3 cent fares on streetcars from 5 a. m. to 8 p. m., has been defeated. The vote stood 30,648 against, and 22,259 for the measure.

VALLEJO, Cal.—The cruiser New Orleans is expected to arrive at Mare Island next week from Honolulu to discharge her ammunition and then proceed to the Bremerton navy yard. Her crew has been doing almost three years' continuous service in China. Although the ship itself has not been there that long, the crew was transferred.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind.—Ortie Mangal, continuing his story of dynamiting in which he is alleged to have acted with or for the McNamaras, was today again on the stand in the federal probe here. It is believed that his story today dealt with the dynamiting of the Boston opera house.

STOCKS ARE ACTIVE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—After opening with a steady undertone but with practically no movement in quotations, the stock market today became active and with a good demand for United States Steel and the railroad leaders, the list generally moved up. St. Paul gained a point, as did Union Pacific and Reading. United States Steel touched 66 1/2, and at this price was taken in large blocks. The market's tone improved distinctly, the change resulting largely from increased buying of the leading railroad issues. The trading was largely professional and the fluctuations of some stocks showed the results of manipulation. The market closed strong. Bonds were firm.

BILLY DELANEY HAS PASSED AWAY

Man Who Made Three World Champion Fighters Dies at His Home at Oakland—Had Been Ill for Some Time.

OAKLAND, Cal., Jan. 25.—"Billy" Delaney, one of the best known sporting men in the United States and the man who is credited with having "made James J. Jeffries," died at his home at 9:40 o'clock last night of liver trouble. He passed away and apparently without suffering while asleep. The announcement of his death was not made until today.

Delaney was 58 years of age, was born in New York and came to the Pacific coast in 1875. His wife, two nurses and a physician were with him when death came. The end had been expected, as Delaney has been in ill health for many months.

Delaney was considered the greatest handler of fighters that ever lived. He enjoyed the distinction of having sent three men to the heavyweight championship of the world—Corbett, Jeffries and Johnson.
