STOCKYARDS TO BE MOVED SOON

A. S. Rosenbaum, Superintendent of the Medford Division of the Southern Pacific, says unsightly pens are to go soon.

MAY SHUT OUT ALL FIGHTS IN NEW YORK

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 25.—The lid may once more be clamped on boxing exhibitions in New York state as the result of a bill introduced in the lower house today by Assemblyman Allen. The measure calls for the repeal of the law legalizing boxing which also provides for a state athletic commission.

In introducing his bill Assemblyman Allen declared that the boxing game had been brought into disrepute by the promoters of New York City and that the entire state demanded the repeal of the law. He contended that the present law was being continually violated as the bouts staged in New York were nothing less than prizefights, and that the law never intended to permit this.
