

HARMON FRIEND OF ALL GOOD MEN

He Says So Himself in an Authorized Interview in the Outlook—"I Am a Friend of the Classes and the Classes Are Friends of Mine."

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Declaration that he is the friend of everybody who is straight and square, whether he be the president of a big corporation or a street laborer, is made by Governor Judson Harmon of Ohio, democratic presidential possibility, in the current issue of the Outlook. Harmon's statement is in the form of an "authorized interview," and says in part:

"Of itself a corporation is neither good nor bad. It is only what its officers make it. From my viewpoint there is nothing to be gained by fixing a corporation. Proper and effective punishment of the men really responsible for wrongdoing is the only thing that will have an immediate and wholesome effect."

Referring to the quip of the Gridiron club in Washington which quoted him as saying: "I am a friend of the classes, and the classes are friends of mine," Governor Harmon said:

"I want to be friendly with everybody who is on the square. It makes no difference whether he is a farm laborer, or a trust president, so long as he does the right thing. But I am against grafters. As for the classes being friends of mine, I don't know whether they are or not. If they are and are hoping to get something from me that they should not have, they are going to be fooled."

Harmon also declared that so far as Ohio is concerned the initiative and referendum measures are still in an experimental stage. In reiterating his opposition to the recall of judges, the governor says:

"Incompetent and unworthy officials are rare exceptions. The call of judges by a mere vote would, I think, be especially injurious to the proper administration of justice."

GOT JOB AS COP; WILL LEAVE ARMY; MARRY

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 26.—Sure now of a job as a Portland policeman, Corporal J. H. Young, first cavalry United States army, stationed at Monterey, Cal., will purchase his discharge from the army immediately and hurry to Portland, where his long deferred wedding will take place.

Young went a-courtin' here, decided that a policeman's salary could support two and passed the civil service examination. Then he waited. The wait became so long that he finally joined the army. His marriage yesterday that 50 new policemen were to be added to the local force and telegraphed for a job.

He received a telegram this morning assuring him of the desired appointment.

IRRIGATION WILL BE PUSHED IN KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 26.—The year 1912 promises to be a record maker in irrigation matters. As soon as the elements will permit the reclamation service will begin work on the Poe Valley extension of the main canal and on the Griffith lateral, to carry water to about 6000 acres. The water to irrigate the lands under the Griffith lateral will be taken from the Lost River diversion dam. The contractors have this concrete structure about completed and the diversion canal is far enough along that the flood waters coming down Lost River this spring will be dumped into the Klamath river instead of flowing into Tule lake as heretofore.

GAS LEAKS; ONE DEAD, ANOTHER IS DYING

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 26.—George Thorington, 45, was asphyxiated, and his wife, 60, overcome by gas that escaped in their sleeping room early today. Mrs. Thorington was taken to the Pacific hospital, where it was stated that her chances for recovery were slight. The Thoringtons came to Los Angeles from Rome, Mich., two weeks ago. Thorington was in ill health. It is believed he arose in the night to search for medicine and failed to turn the gas cock square when he retired.
