

PLANS CHOSEN FOR NEW CHURCH

Methodists' Building Committee Decides on New Structure—Will Be Submitted to Members on Tuesday.

The building committee of the Methodist Episcopal church, which has had under consideration for a couple of weeks plans for a new church, have decided upon a plan which best suits them, but this decision will not be made known until there has been held an official board meeting of the church, which meeting will be held at the church Tuesday evening, February 6, at 7:30 o'clock.

The plans which will be presented have all been prepared by local architects. The cost of the new church building will in all probability be between \$25,000 and \$30,000. The site already selected for the new house of worship and owned by the church is on the northeast corner of Bartlett and Third streets, one block north from the old church building.

The finance committee of the church report splendid success in their efforts to secure the necessary funds with which to build the new church. It is expected the old church and the lots upon which it stands will be sold at a fairly good price, which will go a long way in paying the expenses of the new one. There is great assurance given by this committee that a new church will be built this coming season and that work on it will be started within a short time.

Every officer of the church is expected to be present at the meeting Tuesday night.

PIONEER CITIZEN OF COUNTY DIES

Edward P. Vickroy, a pioneer citizen of Jacksonville, died in that city Friday morning, February 2, 1912, aged 84 years, 9 months and 27 days.

Deceased was a native of Ohio and came to Jacksonville in 1853. He had intended returning to his native state soon after his arrival in Jacksonville, but about that time the Indian wars broke out in the valley and instead of going east he remained here and fought shoulder to shoulder with other brave men of those nerve testing days of Indian massacres and personal privations. Mr. Vickroy was a bachelor and followed mining and farming as a means of gaining a livelihood.

Funeral services will be held at the grave in the Jacksonville cemetery, Saturday at 2:30 o'clock, Rev. Johnson officiating.

SELL CHILDREN TO STAY HUNGER

Famine Situation in Southeastern Russia Is Daily Becoming More Serious—Hunger and Typhus Claim Hundreds of Victims.

ODESSA, Feb. 2.—Starving peasants in the government of Orebung are selling their children to the Khirgese, to work in the mines, according to reports received here today.

The famine situation in southeastern Russia is daily becoming more serious. In the government of Saratoff, there is an epidemic of hunger-typhus, which is claiming hundreds of victims. It is stated that in some of the villages 70 per cent of the children have been stricken.

Despite the stringent orders from St. Petersburg prohibiting relief by private individuals and organizations, word comes from Kisehten gold fields that English residents there are distributing a fund of \$5000, which it is estimated will be sufficient to keep 7000 persons alive for one month.
