


Mrs. Mutt Is Perfectly Capable of Taking Care of Her Family Alone

SILVER LAKE GUNMAN KILLED BY SHERIFF

SILVER LAKE, Ore., Feb. 7.—The body of C. E. Shaffer, gunman, who was killed in a duel with three deputy sheriffs who had gone into the woods to arrest him for wounding Charles Smith, was brought here today, where an inquest will be held.

After wounding Smith, Shaffer fled. He was pursued by Deputies C. D. Reeder, C. W. Jones and K. O. Chiek. When ordered to surrender Shaffer opened fire. A number of shots were exchanged before the gunman was shot and instantly killed.
