

CROWDS FLOCK TO HEAR PARSONS

Evangelist Parsons Tells of Three Ways of Rejecting the Gospel—Violently, Scornfully and Politely—Thousands in Latter Class.

The evangelistic meetings at the Presbyterian church are still continuing to be full of interest and are being well attended. These services are to close this week. An invitation is extended to all to attend these meetings. These people want you to attend; they want you to get right with God; they want you to lead the Christlike life. There is nothing unfair about this, because of the fact that such a life makes any man a better citizen, a better man to his family and when a man has been molded spiritually into all of these no harm has been done him, but good has been done the man himself in that his soul has been saved.

Dr. Parsons used last night the following topic for his sermon:

Polite Rejections of the Gospel.

There are three ways of rejecting the gospel—violently, scornfully and politely. In my own experience I have never encountered the first, but few of the second and literally thousands of the third in the form of trivial excuses.

These excuses the Master dealt with in the parable are fair samples. None of them have grown more wise or plausible as the years have been added to them.

It is useless to argue them any more than the Master did. He showed their results in a word picture. If I were to answer every excuse I ever heard some of you would make another way out while I was at it. Just as a coyote digs another exit when you try to drown him out. So, what is the use?

But here are some facts about excuses that turn aside the gospel appeal: They seem to you to justify your rejection of Christ; they seem polite; they seem plausible, but "there is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death."

The great outstanding fact is that they are rejections. The how of politeness is made to do duty for submission. In reality they fail as a justification because God don't O.K. them. They are a piece of ingratiation because they treat lightly all of God's preparation for man's salvation. They are usually an insult to God because in their last analysis they reflect back on his wisdom, reasonableness or kindness.

"They are a smooth, diplomatic persistency in sin and its guilt and usually are at bottom presumption. You think God will stand it."

"In their subjective effects they forestall repentance, blind the intellect, harden the emotions and stifle the conscience, and rob you of golden opportunities through procrastination."

In their origin Bunyan pictured a fiend whispering blasphemies into the ear of Christian, and if you could see through the veil most likely this is what you would see when an excuse leaps lightly to your lips to parry the gospel appeal!"
