PINCHOT FIGHTS RAKER'S MEASURE

Charges Water Power Trust With Blocking Back of California Congressman's Bill Granting Rights in National Forests to Power Developers.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—Charging the water power trust with "exerting its enormous interests" to pass the hydro-electric bill introduced by Congressman Raker of California, Gifford Pinchot today, through the National Conservation association, appealed to congress to defeat the measure. Vote on the bill comes up in the house tomorrow, Pinchot said.

"If the Raker bill is passed it would set a dangerous precedent for giving away public property to water power interests for nothing. Congressman Raker's assertion to the contrary is a transparent pretense. This is conclusively proved by numerous telegrams pouring in upon congressmen from water power interests and its allies all over the country. The concerns would not be active unless they were interested. Their enormous influence is exerted to pass a bill which on its face involves only \$75 annually. The fact is, they give the passage of the measure would help them to escape regulation in the interest of the public. The Raker bill constitutes a dangerous attack upon the conservation policy and public welfare."

U'REN TO AID IN CALIFORNIA

Father of Oregon System Confering With Progressive Leaders in Gold-coin State—Is on His Way South—Plans for Tax Amendment.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 12.—W. S. U'Ren, known as the "father of the initiative and referendum" and for years head of the direct legislation movement in Oregon, is in San Francisco today. While here Mr. U'Ren is conferring with the leaders of the government movement for a constitutional amendment for a home rule taxation which will be placed before the people of California by initiative petition. A similar amendment was adopted in Oregon and experience has suggested some slight amendments which will make the measure more easily operative without the necessity of enabling legislation.

Mr. U'Ren is now on his way to southern California. Upon his return here he may address a public meeting on the Oregon system and related matters of direct legislation with special reference to California problems.

WASHINGTON TAXES SHOW INCREASE IN PAST YEAR OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 12.—Taxes for all public purposes, state, county and school, for the year 1911 amounted to \$29,630,233, or \$25.43 per capita, \$127.16 for a family of five persons, says a statement prepared by the state tax commission.

This shows an increase of \$1,946,254 over 1910. One of the interesting features of the report is that the total increase, \$947,436, is paid through the railroads of the state.

CHINESE REBELS LURE IMPERIALS INTO TRAP LONDON, Feb. 12.—Chinese rebels in the province of Anhwei are today reported to have lured General Chang Hsun's imperial army into a trap which cost hundreds of lives and resulted in another rebel victory. Rebels mined their trenches, pretended to retreat, and when the imperial troops were caught, exploded the mines.
