

METHODISTS TO BUILD CHURCH

Board Decides to Commence Construction of \$12,000 Structure to Be Located on Third and Bartlett Streets.

A meeting of the official board of the First Methodist Episcopal church was held Monday evening, at which it was decided to at once commence the construction of a new church building.

About a year ago the church purchased a lot 100x100 feet in size on the northeast corner of Third and North Bartlett streets, one block north of the present church building, and it is upon this ground that the new church will be built. There were some members of the board who favored the proposed site at the corner of Eighth and South Ivy streets, but as the church now owns this property on Bartlett and Third streets it was considered unwise to attempt to pay \$10,000 for the Ivy street property.

The new church is to be of bungalow design, and is to have a seating capacity of 750. It is to be built either of wood or cement blocks and is to cost not over \$12,000. In addition to this there is to be expended from \$2000 to \$5000 in furnishing the church.

It is expected that the old church building and grounds will be sold and the sales price applied on the new church building.

Work is to commence on the new building just as soon as the architect can prepare the plans and contractors can be given an opportunity to submit bids.

The present church building is by far too small to accommodate the present attendance. Last Sunday at the morning services the church was packed to its capacity and some left who could not secure seats. The most inconvenient condition is that of the Sunday school. Every Sunday over a hundred members of the school are compelled to go into tents and nearby dwellings to hold their morning sessions. This is surely an unpleasant condition in that it continues for any great length of time there is danger of the school attendance diminishing instead of increasing as has been the case for the past year, hence it is imperative that the new building be gotten ready for occupancy just as soon as is possible.

THIRTEEN SALOONS IN SHASTA COUNTY CLOSED

CAMORRISTS TO ESCAPE GALLOWS

Generally Believed That State Has Failed to Prove Its Case Although Connection With Camorra Proved Satisfactorily.

VITERBO, Italy, Feb. 13.—With the resumption of arguments in the Camorrist trial today, it is generally believed that the state has failed to prove its case, and practically everybody connected with the famous trial expects that the accused men will be acquitted.

That the men on trial were connected with the Camorra there is little doubt, but there has been a total absence of direct evidence to prove that any of them had any connection with the murder of Cnoccolo and his wife at Naples.

The whole prosecution depends largely upon the testimony of Abbenaccio, the informer, who turned state's evidence and the defense has cast grave doubt on his sanity.

M'NAMARAS' COUSIN TRIES SUICIDE ROUTE

ABERDEEN, Wash., Feb. 13.—James McNamara, identified by letters and telegrams as a cousin of James B. and John J. McNamara, set fire to his mattress in his jail cell here and later tried to commit suicide in the jail bathtub.

McNamara was arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct. He produced letters showing he was a cousin of the McNamaras convicted of dynamiting in Los Angeles and a railroad ticket to Los Angeles. The man was released and took a south-bound train.

SAN FRANCISCO TO HAVE MUNICIPAL OPERA HOUSE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 13.—San Francisco is to have a municipal opera house in the projected civic center by the time the 1915 fair is ready to welcome the world. It will cost \$750,000 and will rival anything of its kind anywhere.

Supervisor Henry Payot will Monday next present to the board of supervisors a resolution opening the way for the land grant by the city.

While the institution will be owned by the city, the taxpayers will not pay for it. The Musical association of San Francisco is financing the project.

Colonel Marshall Dodd Dead.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 13.—The body of Colonel Marshall Dodd, a pioneer San Franciscan, was found today in a vacant lot here. It is believed he succumbed to apoplexy. Colonel Dodd commanded the famous Third United States cavalry during the civil war.

NEW CREAMERY FOR APPLIGATE

Farmers Organize Cooperative Plant and Recall New Machinery—Brand Will Be "Valley Pride"—New Building Erected.

Citizens of Applegate are installing a carload of machinery for the "Valley Pride" cooperative creamery located near Pernal's store. The machinery is of the most modern type and the plant, when completed, will be the best of its kind in the state, so it is claimed. Aside from the usual butter making equipment the plant includes a complete refrigeration unit of two tons daily capacity.

A two-story building has been completed to receive the machinery, the first floor being of solid concrete with cement floors and walls in all the work rooms, the office only being finished in wood.

The product of this creamery will be known as "Valley Pride" butter. The capacity of the plant will be 1200 pounds daily.

A. L. Bates has charge and a high grade product is guaranteed. Mr. Bates was for nearly two years manager of the Applegate-Williams creamery, severing his connection with that company January 1 of this year.

The new company is composed of farmers owning dairy herds, farmers who recognize the value of a creamery as a wealth producer, the greater number of them having had and still retaining stock in the Applegate-Williams creamery, which institution distributed \$1500 monthly to the farmers and paid 30 per cent on the stock.

NEW CHEMICAL TARIFF FAVORED

Democratic House Committee on Ways and Means Approves Revision of Payne Law Which Will Increase Governmental Revenues.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Revision of the chemical schedule according to the Payne tariff law was accepted today by the democratic house committee on ways and means. The new measure is expected to increase governmental revenues by from \$12,000,000 to \$16,000,000 a year. This is the first of the tariff bills to be reported on favorably by the democrats which fails to reduce revenues, and it also departs from the democratic system of making all duties on an ad valorem basis. The rates on chemicals were made specific because it is difficult to ascertain the exact value of chemical products necessary for an ad valorem rate.

The tariff board also, for the first time, assisted the democrats in framing a revision bill.

GOTHAM SCANDAL WILL BE AIRED

New York Said to Be Facing Political and Judicial Scandal as Result of the Retrial of Schiff's Former Valet.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—New York today is declared to be facing one of the worst political and judicial scandals in its history. Folke Brandt, former valet to Mortimer Schiff of the famous Schiff family of bankers, brought here from Sing Sing prison and kept in seclusion, is expected to make the expose.

Five years ago Brandt was sentenced to 30 years' imprisonment on a charge of first degree burglary. He was alleged to have robbed Schiff. Today Brandt declares he was "rail-roaded" to prison, and he is scheduled to appear in response to a writ of habeas corpus issued Friday last, before Justice Gerard.

Attorney General Carmody opposed Brandt's release. Judge Rosalsky sentenced Brandt.

TO CELEBRATE ADMISSION DAY

Hunt to Be Inaugurated Governor of Arizona Without Ostentation or Display Tomorrow—Public Holiday Is Proclaimed.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 13.—Without ostentation or display George W. P. Hunt will be inaugurated first governor of the new state of Arizona here tomorrow. The day was proclaimed a public holiday by Governor Sloan, and already Phoenix is filling with visitors for the ceremonies.

A salute of 48 guns will usher in admission day. In the morning a civic parade, without military features, will be the first official event. After this Hunt will walk to the capitol, where Chief Justice Edward Kent of the territorial supreme court will administer the oath.

The evening program includes an unique inaugural ball. The dancers will make merry in a huge open air pavilion. The ball will be informal, no invitations having been issued, and it will be free to all.
