YELLOW JOURNALS DENOUNCED IN CONGRESS FOR JINGOISM

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Denunciation of yellow journalism was voiced in the house today by Representative Shelden of Texas in a declaration in which he asserted that the actions of the sensational press look like an effort to involve the United States in a war.

"For thirty days my attention has been drawn to a series of newspaper publications of a sensational nature," he said. "These articles have been written about the affairs of Cuba and Mexico and Cuba; about an alleged menace from Japan and intrigues with Germany. I don't believe any of them."

"I protest against this practice as being an inexcusable effort to disturb the peace of our nation. It is nothing but blatant yellow journalism with official or semi-official approval, and it looks like an effort to say and do things which will involve the country in a war."

COLLIER GOING TO WORK FOR ROOSEVELT DELEGATES

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Colonel D. C. Collier, president of the San Diego Panama-Pacific exposition company, who has been in Washington conferring with President Taft, is in New York today, where he held a conference with Colonel Theodore Roosevelt.

Emerging from Roosevelt's office in the Outlook, Colonel Collier said: "I am going to California and will take off my coat and hustle for delegates pledged to Roosevelt."
