ARMY CAPTAIN FLEES; LEAVES WIFE AND DEBTS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 15.—Captain J. D. Reams, Company H, 30th United States infantry, an athletic officer at the Presidio, is missing today, leaving, it is declared, a trail of debts behind him and deserting his wife and two young children.

Ten years ago, in the Philippines, Captain Reams' troubles are said to have begun when a Chinese tailor tendered his bill to the regimental adjutant. The captain was court-martialed and it was found that he was \$4000 in debt. An agreement was reached by which he was to pay \$100 a month until he was clear.

When the regiment was ordered to the Mexican border last summer, Captain Reams was again pressed for funds, but he struggled along until Christmas, when he told Colonel McClure that he could make no further payments. It was not known that he had violated his agreement and contracted other debts, but his resignation and disappearance today brought another expose.

WOULD AMEND SPEECH MADE BY KING GEORGE

LONDON, Feb. 15.—Sounding the keynote of the labor party in the house of commons here today, J. R. McDonald moved to amend King George's address to parliament. He expressed regret that his majesty had failed to recommend minimum wage regulation legislation, the nationalization of railroads and other measures designed "to procure an equal division of the fruits of industry."

Stocks Gain.

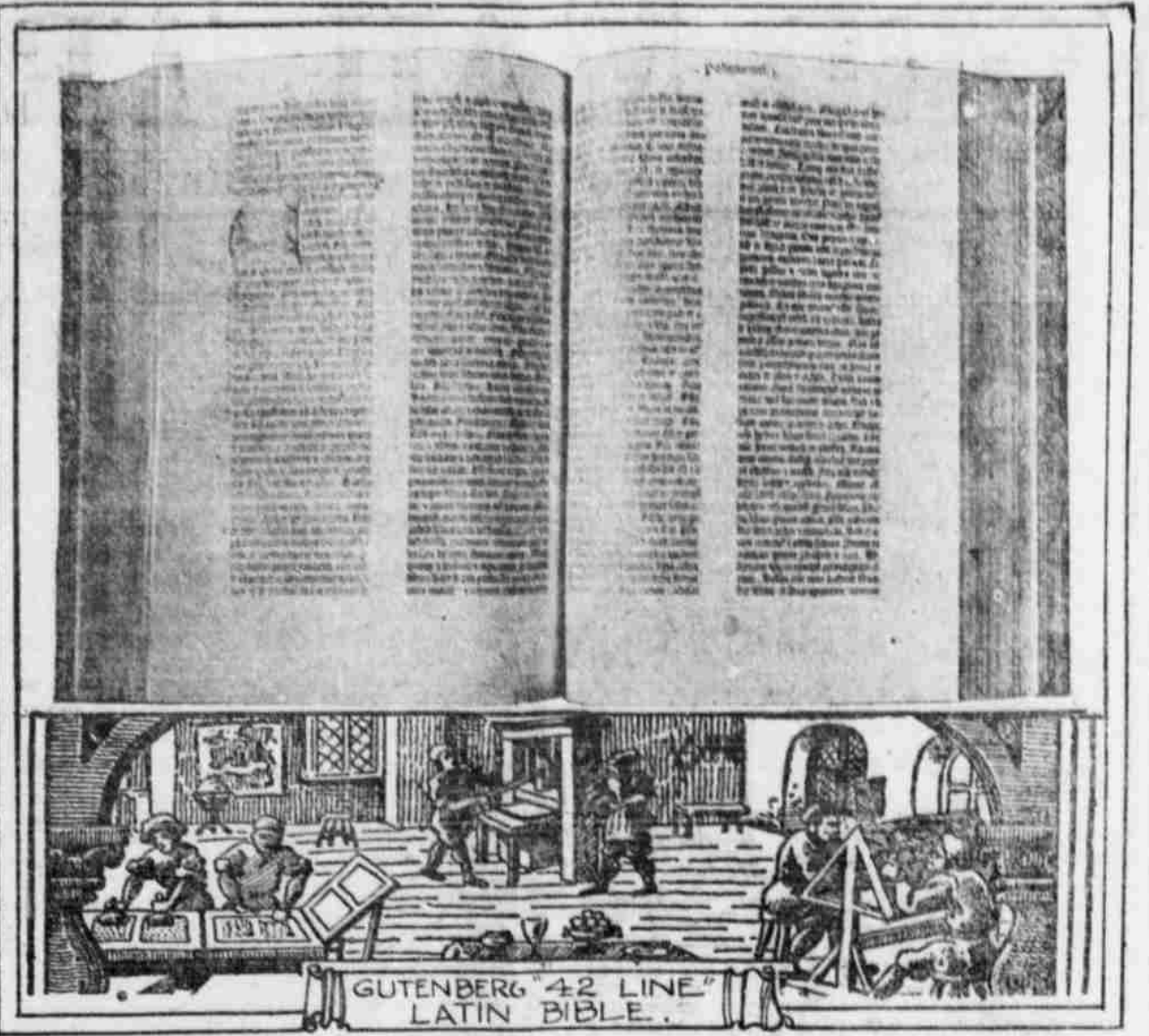
NEW YORK, Feb. 15.—When today's stock market opened Reading, in good demand, rose 5-8 and Canadian Pacific was up 1 1/4. Northern Pacific gained 1 1/2 and the entire market was steady at about yesterday's close. Later, under weakness of United States Steel, the market fell back, Lehigh Valley dropping 1 and Reading 5-8. Buying soon sent the leaders up again briskly. Canadian Pacific jumped 2 1/2 and Union Pacific 1 point.

Bernard Quaritch, of London, at the second day's sale captured a Gutenberg Bible at \$27,500, a price that stunned his rivals. The Bible is in two volumes, at the end of each of which is an attestation dated in 1471, showing that it belonged to a priest connected with the Cathedral of Utrecht.

APPORTION WATER OF ROGUE RIVER

Superintendent Chinook Prepares Exhaustive Information for Public—Will Have Statement Ready to Issue Soon.

According to word received here, James T. Chinook, superintendent of water division No. 1, is preparing to open to public inspection next month the proofs and testimony taken before the board of control in the adjudication of water rights of the Rogue river and its tributaries. This will be followed by the taking of testimony in contest cases.

In connection with the adjudication of the water of this stream Superintendent Chinook says he is preparing the most complete and exhaustive index and digest of all claims filed on Rogue river and its tributaries ever attempted in this state in a case of this character. He is also making complete maps of the streams and the districts they serve. All of this information will also be open for public inspection next month.
