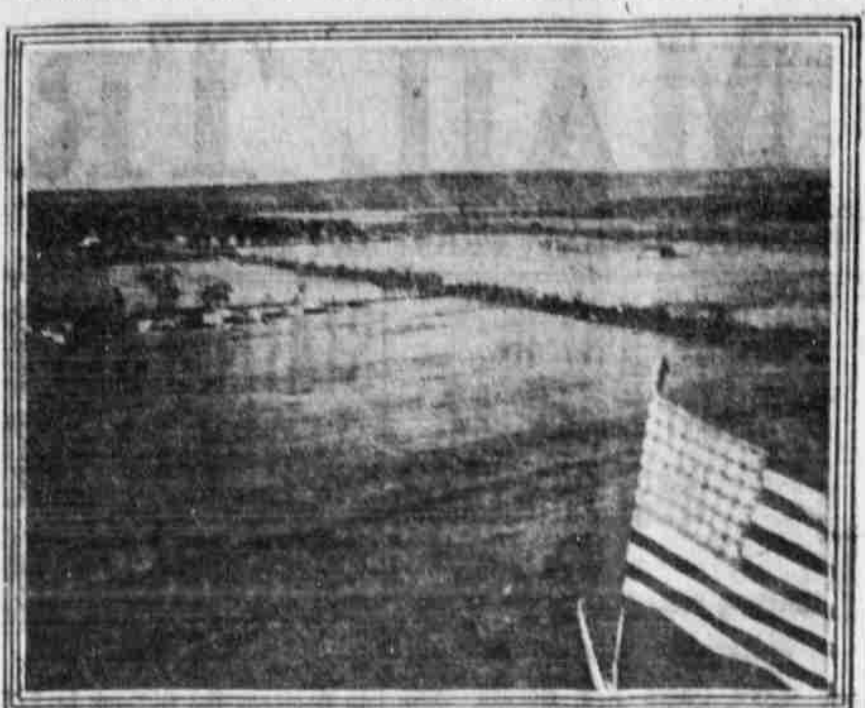

ARMY AVIATION CAMP SEEN FROM AEROPLANE.



ARMY AVIATION CAMP, TAKEN FROM AEROPLANE AT HEIGHT OF 700 FEET. FLAG IS ON MACHINES.

Reports received from Captain Charles de F. Chandler, in charge of the United States army aviation camp at Augusta, Ga., show the value of the aeroplane for scouting purposes. Observations and maps showing the topography of the country in the neighborhood of Augusta accompany the reports much of the material being obtained with the aid of the camera while in rapid flight above the earth. Several plates made at an altitude of 700 feet gave such good results that Brigadier General James Allen is encouraging the aviators to further experiments at greater altitude.

LEEVEE FOR COUNTY JUDGE

Central Point Herald Announces Candidacy of Central Point's Chief Executive for the County Judgeship.

The Central Point Herald announces the candidacy of W. C. Leever for county judge as follows:

Protest against inefficiency in the administration of county affairs crystallized last Monday evening at a meeting of the commercial club when after some comment along the lines of "What Jackson county needs, and why?" President J. W. Myers proposed the name of Mayor W. C. Leever for the office of county judge and as soon as the applause subsided a resolution endorsing the suggestion was unanimously adopted.

It was urged by a number of members, of all shades of political belief, that what the county most needs just now, and what it must have, if the people are to continue in such a condition of solvency as will enable them to pay their taxes, is a strictly business administration of county affairs. Too much money is being squandered and too many favorites are being played, was the burden of many remarks pertaining to county affairs, and it seemed patent to practically every speaker that some radical change is now due.

Friends of Mr. Leever have since been acting on the suggestion of Monday evening and it is reported that a strong element of support has been developed for him in other sections of the county.

FREAK OF FORTUNE SAVES MEN AT SEA

SAN PEDRO, Cal., Feb. 16.—Saved from certain death at sea, by a freak of fortune which washed a small boat off its davits on the after-hoop of the schooner Ida McKay when she tumbled turtle 100 miles off the northern California coast February 2, Captain Lindgren and seven members of the Ida's crew reached San Pedro today on the schooner Azalia, which picked them up after they had drifted helplessly for more than two days.

The Ida McKay, owned by the Pacific States Trading company, left Coquille River, Ore., for San Francisco January 27. She was caught in a terrific gale and sprang a leak, finally turning over in latitude 41 north, longitude 132 west.

The little boat, which floated from the wreck, was secured and a gunny-sack hoisted as a distress signal. The men were without food or water until picked up by the Azalia. All the crew were saved.
