Peaches and pears should be sprayed as soon as the weather permits; apples may be left until later. By applying the spray just as the buds are beginning to break will give the best results.

This order to spray includes both commercial orchards and the trees found on city property. Therefore, all owners, agents or lessees of city property are hereby ordered to comply with the law. Failure to do so may necessitate the removal of such trees, vines or shrubs not sprayed by the county inspector.


