NOTICE TO SPRAY

In accordance with the horticultural laws of the state of Oregon all orchard fruit trees, shrubs, vines, roses, etc., must be sprayed with a lime-sulphur solution in order to control San Jose scale and such other insect pests as may be controlled with lime-sulphur. This spray shall be applied at a strength or test of not less than 4.5 degrees Beaume, or 1.03 specific gravity. In order to dilute the concentrated commercial lime-sulphur solution to the above test, the following table may be used.

Table with columns: Gallons, Gallons, Lime-sulphur, water. Rows for 30 degree test, 32 degree test, 33 degree test, 34 degree test, 35 degree test, 36 degree test, 37 degree test.

The above table is in accordance with the best practice, and no attention should be paid to the directions for diluting as found upon the container. Peaches and pears should be sprayed as soon as the weather permits; apples may be left until later. By applying the spray just as the buds are beginning to break will give the best results.

This order to spray includes both commercial orchards and the trees found on city property. Therefore, all owners, agents or lessees of city property are hereby ordered to comply with the law. Failure to do so may necessitate the removal of such trees, vines or shrubs not sprayed, by the county inspector.
