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COMMITTEE AT WORK ON BILLS

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 23.—With W. B. Ayer, of the Eastern and Western Lumber company in the chair, the five members of a committee just appointed by Governor West to pass on the merits or demerits of the several good road bills which have been subjected to discussion probably will meet in Portland Monday, when the first steps toward reconciling the differences between various good roads factions will be undertaken.

The governor has requested a report within ten days. It is expected that they will formulate a good roads bill satisfactory to the majority of proponents of the better highways.

During the early hours polling was heavy and indications were an extraordinary vote would be cast.

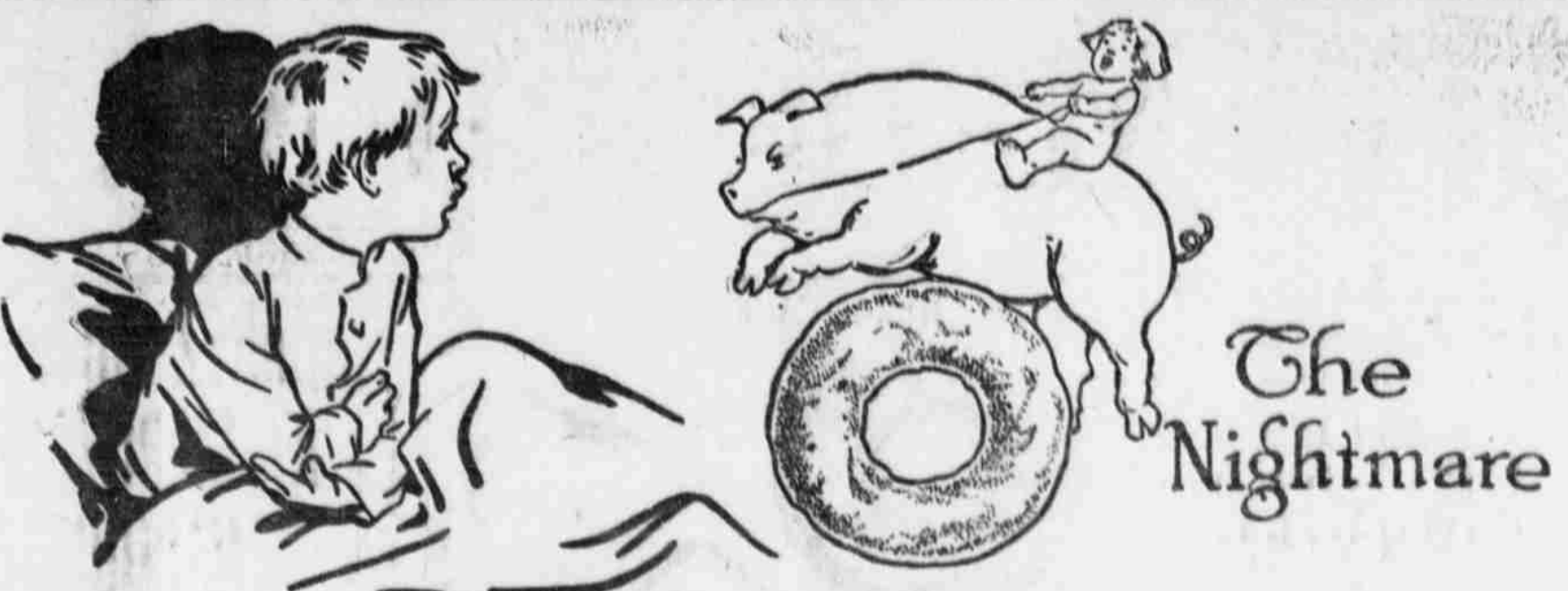
The campaign for the commission form of government has been conducted by a committee of 50 business men.
