

## ART TREASURES IN MYSTERY HOUSE

Miser's Palace Yields Many Rare Objects—Gets First Cleaning in Quarter of Century—Beautiful Ivories and Bronzes Found.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Samuel E. Haslett, the aged Brooklyn recluse whose \$500,000 estate former State Senator Frank J. Gardner and Gen. J. Decker, a nurse, are charged with conspiring to control, probably will be able to appear in court next Friday, when proceedings to name a committee to take charge of his estate are to come up. Mr. Haslett's condition was improved greatly today.

The district attorney of Kings county began an investigation of the case to determine if there is ground for grand jury action.

For the first time in a quarter of a century Haslett's "house of mystery" underwent a cleaning today, and the removal of dust and dirt revealed art treasures that would have done credit to a museum. There were many paintings by famous artists, almost obliterated by the accumulation of dust, and numerous shelves of ivories of beautiful handwork, small bronze gods and bric-a-brac from every quarter of the globe.

Many canceled checks for amounts running to thousands of dollars representing charitable gifts for many years also were found.

## JOHNSON TO MEET FLYNN AT LAS VEGAS

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Feb. 23.—Jack Johnson, heavyweight champion, will defend his title against Jim Flynn, the Pueblo fireman, at Las Vegas, N. M., July 4. This information was contained in a letter from a prominent business man of Las Vegas to a brother in this city. According to the letter, final arrangements were made and the papers signed February 18. Official announcement of the site will not be made until May 1.

## WILSON AND CLARK SPLIT OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Feb. 23.—After wrangling all night in a hopeless effort to send a solid delegation to the national convention at Baltimore pledged either to the candidacy of Governor Woodrow Wilson or New Jersey or Speaker Champ Clark of Missouri, the Oklahoma state democratic convention early today finally divided the state's delegation between the two candidates named.

## DEPOSITION IS READ AT TRIAL OF CASHIER

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 23.—When the third trial of the case in which the insurance of George A. Kimmell, bank cashier, who has been missing from Niles, Mich., for 13 years, is involved, was resumed today, the deposition of Anson Byther, of Niles, was read. It described two alleged visits made to Kimmell's mother in Niles by the claimant, who, instead of being the real George Kimmell, is claimed by the plaintiff in the suit, a receiver for a Niles bank, to be in reality Andrew J. White, a former convict.

The bank receiver contends that Kimmell was killed in an Oregon forest in 1898 by J. A. Johnson, and that Johnson later was killed by J. B. Swinney, who is expected to be one of the principal witnesses.

## CHINESE MURDER STIRS UP PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Feb. 23.—Two shootings, one of them fatal, occurred tonight in Chinatown. In one instance it was, according to the police, a tong affair, but in the other it was personal matter.

Shue Ling, a canneryman, was shot and killed in the kitchen of a Chinese tenement. The police are holding Jong Was in connection with this crime, on a charge of murder.

The other shooting was the serious wounding of Seld Wing, a cousin of Seld Ling, the victim of the trunk mystery.

Lee Sam, whom the police say is a Hop Sing man, is under arrest in connection with the shooting. Seld is said to have been active in the prosecution of prisoners charged with Seld Ling's murder, the prisoners being also Hop Sing people.

## FINDS BOMB IN COFFEE POT

New York Policeman Makes Discovery in Time—Mysterious Circumstances Envelops Startling Investigation in Tenement House.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Patrolman Storgan, posing a tenement house on Avenue B, on the east side, early today rubbed his eyes and pinched himself when he suddenly noticed a blackened coffee pot resting on the icy doorstep and steaming and sputtering as though a redhot stove was beneath.

The policeman went closer to investigate and saw sparks coming from the spout. Lifting the cover he revealed a long, smoking fuse, communitating with a black mass in the bottom of the pot. Storgan scooped up a handful of snow and packed it down tight over the fuse, extinguishing the blaze.

Then he carried the pot gingerly to his precinct headquarters, where the experts diagnosed it as one of the most dangerous bombs that has been found in many months.

Dwellers questioned all the

dwellers in the tall tenement, but not one of them could give any clue to the attempted outrage.

## SECRETARY DENIES FLORIDA LETTER

Wilson Says He Did Not Write Advertisement—Paper Credits Him With Superlative Statement About Everglade Lands.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Secretary Wilson has denied authorship of a letter which has been widely circulated by one of the companies exploiting land in the Florida everglades. The advertisement, headed "Secretary Wilson's Opinion," was credited to the East Coast Homeseekers of June, the year not being given. The purported letter follows in part:

"There is nowhere a large body of land anywhere in the United States, in fact anywhere else in the world, that will, when the drainage is completed, be so valuable as the once despised everglades. Between three and four million acres of rich alluvial lands, located in a climate that is almost absolutely perfect, where all crops can be grown the entire season through, where there are no long, cold winters, excessive heat in summer and no malaria or other diseases."

## EPWORTH LEAGUE HOLDS BANQUET

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 23.—While protesting that the new conditions tend to create confusion and an abnormal condition of marketing grains a mass convention of grain producers and handlers here today at the same time discussed plans to meet the requirements of the recent ruling of the bureau of chemistry in regard to the conditions under which grain must be shipped and marketed. The grain men are inclined to find fault particularly with the interpretation concerning the liability incurred in the shipping of corn for interstate commerce. They declared that the law as interpreted by the bureau of chemistry renders it most hazardous for buyers and shippers of corn to purchase for shipment in interstate commerce a large proportion of any of the recognized standard grades of corn.

### DENTIST SAID TO HAVE CONFESSED TO ROBBERY

CHEHALIS, Wash., Feb. 23.—Albert F. Clark, held for the murder of Lawrence Barr, president of the Central Farmers' & Merchants' bank, confessed this afternoon, according to the prosecuting attorney's office, and implicated as an accomplice Dr. F. D. Johnson, a prominent Centralia dentist, who was later arrested. Hints of startling developments in the Barr case have been heard since it was learned the Lewis county officials have been assisted by a well-known detective agency.

Clark's confession, according to the prosecutors, places the responsibility for planning the attempted hold-up on the dentist, whom he agreed to meet. The confession is said to state they met at a dance at Pe Ell that night and divided the loot. Johnson admits knowing Clark and having visited him in jail, but protests his entire innocence of any connection with the attempted robbery. Barr was killed while resisting Clark, who was overpowered in the melee that followed Clark's entry into the room.

### HILL INTERESTS SECURE STOCK IN LAND GRANT

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 23.—News was received here today that Louis Hill, president of the Great Northern Railroad company, has, with W. P. Davidson, a capitalist of St. Paul, acquired practically all the stock of the Oregon & Western Colonization company, which controls 800,000 acres originally acquired in a grant from the government by the Willamette & Cascade Mountain Military Wagon Road company.

The land embraces a belt of indefinite width, 400 miles long, and extends through Central Oregon from the Cascades to the eastern boundary of Oregon.

It is rumored the intention of Hill is to resign the presidency of the Great Northern and take the management of the land company, and also that he will be succeeded by Carl R. Gray, present head of the Hill lines in Oregon.

## PLAN TO BLOCK ORCHARD HEAD

Armstrong as Receiver Asks Restraining Order—Does Not Want Creditors to Proceed With Sale of Defunct Property.

SEATTLE, Feb. 23.—A. H. Litchfield and Robert Hodges, real estate dealers, and Mrs. Isabella Forbes, formerly stenographer for De Larm & Blehl, promoters of the bankrupt Columbia River Orchard company and Washington Orchard Irrigation and Fruit company, were subpoenaed today to testify before the federal grand jury at Portland, Ore., that is investigating the alleged misuse of the mails by W. E. De Larm and Alton Jay Blehl. The promoters are alleged to have used the names of many Seattle real estate dealers as references. Some of these dealers are alleged to have negotiated sale of the companies' bonds, which are now worthless.

Receiver Louis P. Siehler of the bankrupt companies applied today to the United States court for an order restraining George W. Armstrong of Spokane, Wash., a creditor, from proceeding with the foreclosure sale of the companies' assets at Wahluke, Grant county, Wash. Armstrong it is

said, had obtained an order at Spokane for sale of the property February 23.
