MINING NEWS

Southern Oregon possesses vast, virgin mineral resources, yet it is not known to the mining world as a mineral country, but is noted chiefly for its horticultural products, not for its metallic wealth. It is for the purpose of bringing the great possibilities in mining to the attention of the intending investor that the Mining Men's club was organized. The Mining Men's club is practically a mining bureau, in every sense of the word.
In its hearing on the general welfare and prosperity of the Rogue river country, the Mining Men's club, in the narrowest light you can look upon it, is as powerful for good as the Medford Commercial club. It is not impossible for even the most ordinary citizen to show that the products of mining districts are of far greater commercial value than horticultural and agricultural products, in proportion to the population.
With the development of the mining industry, the number of working mines in this immediate vicinity will naturally increase until there will be hundreds, if not thousands of men, working in the mines and reduction works in the country tributary to Medford, the capital of the Mexican quarter of the United States.
Without the Commercial club's campaign of publicity, the wonderful fertility of the Rogue river lands would have remained unknown to the horticulturalist. Without proper and intelligent mine publicity the untold mineral wealth now lying dormant in the hills, gorges and bench lands of this wonderful portion of the west will necessarily remain buried. It is the intention of the Mining Men's club to do for the mining industry what the Commercial club has done for the farmer and fruit grower.

REBELS HOLD DAUGHTER OF WOODROW WILSON

EL PASO, Feb. 23.—Miss Nellie Wilson, daughter of Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey, and Miss Kitzer, a girl friend, are married at Madero, Chihuahua, according to advices received here tonight. The young women are guests of the family of P. A. Cutchins, manager of a large lumber company. Owing to the increased activity of the rebels in Chihuahua, it is understood Wilson has made demands that his daughter and her friend be given safe conduct to the American border. However, the rebels refuse to permit the railway company to run a train from Madero to Juarez until the situation improves. The same advises state that the town of Madero declared last night in favor of Rojas, the rebel leader, and in celebrating the event a large part of the Mexican quarter was burned.
