PORTLAND CHINATOWN SEETHS WITH EXCITEMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 24.—Chinatown is seething with excitement today and more trouble is feared following the shooting of Seid Wing Thursday. The bullet entered his side and his recovery is doubtful. Lee Sam, a Hop Sing tong man, whom Seid says shot him, is under arrest. A revolver with an empty shell was found on him.

A few minutes before Seid was shot an assassin killed Shu Ding, a cannery foreman. As he belonged to no tong, it is not believed the shootings were connected in any way.

The police are working on the theory that Seid was a victim of the feud between the Seid family and the Hop Sing tong, which developed when Seid Bing's body was found in a trunk in Seattle, and Oi Sen, a Chinese woman, and two Chinamen, members of the Hop Sings, were arrested for his murder here.

W. J. BRYAN TAKES STAND WILL NOT ENTER RACE

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 24.—Declaring he was satisfied if someone else can poll more votes than himself and expressing a willingness to enter the campaign in behalf of "a true democrat," more vigorously than he ever fought in his own behalf, W. J. Bryan in a speech here tonight definitely set at rest reports that he might be induced to make the race for the presidency.

Commission Form at Boise BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 22.—Boice declared for the commission form of government today by a majority of 201 votes.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 24.—Unless Blaine Gordon, the electrician-pitcher of Bremerton, who has thus far been a persistent holdout, comes into camp and signed up, President A. E. Rothermel of the Tacoma baseball club says he will suspend and blacklist him. Rumors that Gordon has been offered strong inducement to desert Rothermel both by the Vancouver and Portland clubs has caused considerable ill feeling to be expressed here.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 23.—Definite charges that the transcontinental railroads are "conspiring" with foreign steamship lines to get rates enforced on the Panama canal by which they will receive all its benefits were made here today before the navy league convention by Congressman Humphrey of Washington.

SUSPENDED IN ARMY ROW.

ATTEMPT MADE BURN LUMBER

Big Pines Lumber Company Object of Firebug's Work—W. C. Green Discovers Attempt in Time to Save Property.

An attempt was made Friday night to burn the lumber yards of the Big Pines Lumber company. About 9:30 Friday night W. C. Green, secretary and treasurer of the company, and the bookkeeper, who were at work in the office near by, discovered smoke coming from the lumber sheds and upon investigation they found that a fire had been set and was burning in the ends of a large pile of kiln dried flooring. The flames were running fully four feet high when discovered, but Mr. Green and the bookkeeper quickly turned on the fire hose and the fire was soon extinguished, but not until a considerable amount of the flooring had been badly charred. That the fire was set by some one with the intention of burning the lumber, sheds and nearby offices there is no doubt, as there were found partially burned pieces of cloth which had been crowded into the end of the pile of flooring and covered over with long bundles of the lumber.

\$1900 IN FINES BLIND PIGGING

George Sauer of Grants-Pass Pleads Guilty and Is Fined \$100—Allowed Seven Days in Which to Pay Fine Imposed by Court.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Feb. 24.—Prosecuting Attorney B. F. Mulkey called up in Justice James Holman's court Friday the case of the state against George Sauer, wherein Sauer was charged with selling intoxicating liquor in prohibition territory. Sauer pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs. Sauer was allowed 7 days within which to pay the fine. The fines in liquor cases now total \$1900.
