HEAVY "NORTHER" BLOWS BUT NO DAMAGE DONE

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 24.—Although a norther that has been blowing steadily for the past thirty-two hours along the California coast at a varying velocity ranging from 30 miles per hour in the city to 88 miles at Point Reyes, no damage of any kind has been reported in this vicinity.

Considerable alarm, however, is felt for the coastwise steamer Newark from Los Angeles, which may have been blown from her course. The marine exchange has not yet received any report from the vessel, although she is overdue.

The only wire trouble recorded was that on the Western Union line in the southern part of the state and in Arizona and in Oregon, where swinging wires delayed service for a time Friday. Conditions are again normal today.

REPUTIATES CONFESSION CONCERNING BABE'S DEATH. NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—Repudiation of a confession in which she admitted responsibility for the death of eight infants at the Brooklyn Nursery and Infants' hospital by oxalic acid poisoning was made here today by Winifred Ankers, an attendant at the institution.

In the confession alleged to have been made by the young woman last night she was made to say that she killed the infants by putting oxalic acid in milk prepared for them. The confession was repudiated by Miss Ankers when a formal charge of murder was lodged against her today.
