FATHER O'FARRELL ADDRESSES STUDENTS

Rev. J. M. O'Farrell gave a brief but interesting address before the student body of the high school this morning, and during the course of his remarks the following excerpts were taken:

"Your education will not cease till you close your eyes in death, and when you leave the portals of this high school you will go out into the world to face the problems of the world, and you are going to take your part in these problems. History, etc., help you to form your opinions of the future, and you ought to take more interest in the problems of the present.

"How many of you can sit down and argue the subject of prison reform as advocated by Governor West? How many of you can speak today, intelligently, upon the subject of the tariff? Now is the time to prepare yourselves for these subjects. On a Sunday morning many of us eagerly open the paper to see what the Katzenjammer kids are doing, or to see what Matt and Jeff have to say. With the same enthusiasm, it would be far better to read those subjects that are making the history of today.

"I am an advocate of women's rights. I say that women should have the right of suffrage, but I do not believe she should hold office.

"When war comes the mother looks eagerly toward her son as he marches away to the field of battle, and when brought home as a sacrifice to the cause for which she has given him, it seems unjust that she should not have had for such a gift

CONVICT TELLS WEST OF THEFT

Five Men Are Implicated in \$57,000 Bullion Robbery of Steamer Humboldt—Convict Uncover Portion of the Bullion.

SALJEM, Ore., Feb. 26.—Five men, it is reported, are implicated in the \$57,000 bullion robbery of the steamer Humboldt, by the confession of Charles Barrett, convict, to Governor West, which was followed by the recovery of 25 pounds of the stolen metal on a farm near Lyons, Ore.

Among those who are said to be involved are Orville Caviness, now serving a term in San Quentin, his brother Frank, who is serving a year at McNeil's island for opium smuggling, James Wheaton, Portland saloonman, now under indictment as a "fence" for the thieves, an ex-convict residing here and another man, name unknown, believed to reside in Seattle.

Barrett, who had buried his share of the bullion, unearthed it in the presence of Warden Curtis and Steve O'Connell, former secret service agent, who accompanied him to the spot.

Barrett was sent to the penitentiary from Multnomah county for forgery after he had been arrested for complicity in the Humboldt robbery in 1910.

Governor West thus far has refused to give out the details of the confession. It is understood arrests will soon be made.

OREGON MOTOR BOAT HOLDS WORLD'S RECORD

PORTLAND, Feb. 26.—Elated by the showing of 39 motor boat Oregon Wolff, which broke the world's record over a thirty mile course by going it in 42 minutes, 14 2/5 seconds, John Wolff, her owner and builder, stated he would construct another boat to participate in the \$20,000 Panama Pacific races in 1915.

STOCKS OPEN WITH A WEAK TENDENCY NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—Today's opening stock market showed a decidedly weak tendency. United States Steel, Union Pacific and Reading dropped from 3-4 to 7-8 and Canadian Pacific was off 1 1/2 and Bethlehem Steel 2 points.
