SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 29.—The forecasted merger of the Independent Telephone company and the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company was verified today by Vice President and General Manager E. C. Bradley, of the Pacific system, in a letter to Mayor Dilling. He stated that his company had absorbed the Independent system, and operation under one system would begin as soon as physical construction work connecting the plants had been completed. Manager Bradley states the rates will not be raised for two years.
