

# SOCIETY

The League of Good Citizenship has been formed in the public school of Medford, under the supervision of the Greater Medford club. The object of this association is to interest the children in all matters relating to good citizenship. Each member is expected to refrain from throwing rubbish of any kind into the streets or other public places and to refrain from injuring or defacing property and to observe the city ordinances. Following are the rules of the organization, which are repeated at each meeting:
