SEATTLE VOTES ON GILL AGAIN

SEATTLE, March 4.—At the municipal election tomorrow Seattle will decide whether or not Hiram C. Gill, the "recalled" mayor of a year ago, is to be "recalled" to office. He is again a candidate and has posed in the campaign as the "reformed" candidate.

Former State Senator George F. Cotterill, is Gill's opponent. The campaign, which began mildly, is ending in a whirlwind of excitement. At the primaries Gill received a lead of 10,000 votes over Cotterill, the next highest man. But as Gill got only 24,630 out of a total registration of over \$74,000, it is figured by Cotterill supporters that he showed his maximum strength at the primaries, and that he will be defeated by the union of the voters at tomorrow's election, whose votes were divided among three candidates at the primaries.
