

### MINT SECRETS GIVEN TO TRUST

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., March 5.—Fresh vigor was added here today to a coast-wide protest against a plan to close the San Francisco mint, which is now being considered both by Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh and the democratic congressional committee on appropriations, when it was stated that the secrets of the government had been thrown open to the smelter trust by the administration.

Definite charges that this was done were made by Harold French, a former chemist in the mint, who declared Charles Mindehoff, chief chemist of the American Smelting & Refining company, had been "loaned" by the Guggenheims to the administration; that he had been given all the secrets of the mints and assay offices at Deadwood, Helena, Salt Lake City, Boise, Carson City, Seattle and San Francisco, and that immediately after he had reported every one of the government offices except that at San Francisco had been closed to the enrichment of the smelter trust and the crippling of mining in the districts affected.

### OUTLOOK GOOD FOR BASEBALL

SAN FRANCISCO, March 5.—With Sacramento in training camp at Marysville, Portland on the way to Santa Maria, Vernon and Los Angeles to leave for Paso Robles tonight, the forward movement in the Pacific Coast league today is on in earnest.

On paper, San Francisco, with 30 odd figures to start the training season with the greatest strength, although Vernon, with its 1911 team practically intact, must not be overlooked. The Oaks, lost some strength by the graduating of Wares, Cutsaw and Maggart.

Portland was hit hardest of all by drafting and sales. "Sig Six" Stead, the Beavers' most reliable twirler, Peckinpaugh, the dashing shortstop, and Buddy Ryan, the demon slugger of the league, will not be in the lineup but this fact is not discouraging Walter McCreid, who is confident that the champions will make it their third pennant in a row.

Sacramento will line up about as it did last year, Shinn and Byron having been returned. The Boston Americans have turned a number of Youngsters over to Manager Graham.

Los Angeles does not show much promise, although it looks better than last year. Captain Dillon has rounded up a number of new men, but they are an unknown quantity.

Danny Long has done the best of all Coast league managers. He lost Vitt and Weaver, but has so much other material to pick from that he does not fear the team will be weakened.

**Texas Independence Day.**

AUSTIN, Texas, March 5.—The seventy-sixth anniversary of the declaration of Texas independence was observed as a public holiday throughout the state today. In 1824 Mexico achieved her independence from Spain and established a republican government. Bustamante, the usurping governor of Texas, prohibited further immigration from the United States, fearing that the white settlers would not be dominated as were the Mexicans.

**Another Victim of Electric Chair.**

AUBURN, N. Y., March 5.—The week beginning today has been fixed as the time for the electrocution in Auburn prison of Edward Burnett, convicted of murder at Dunkirk two years ago. Burnett's victim was John Dougherty, whom he shot and killed in a quarrel. Governor Dix has denied clemency in the case.

**Sick Bears Know Trees.**

FLORENCE, Ore., March 5.—The wheels of the government which were set in motion to discover the pests that have been peeling bark off fir trees, have been stopped. Sick bears, awakened from their winter sleep, gnawed the trees to get the sap as a tonic, it was learned.

### KELLY TO RUN FOR PROSECUTOR

E. E. Kelly of this city today announced his candidacy for district attorney upon the democratic ticket subject to the approval of his party as expressed at the primary election in April.

Mr. Kelly has long and favorably been known throughout the district as an attorney of much experience. He has been identified with many important criminal and civil suits. His platform calls for fearless enforcement of the law.

Mr. Kelly graduated from the Chicago College of Law in 1897, and has been actively engaged in the practice of law since that time with the exception of one year spent in the service of the United States signal corps during the Spanish-American war. He enlisted with North Dakota volunteers and was transferred to 1st company United States volunteer signal corps and went to Manila with the first expedition; was commissioned a lieutenant of that organization by President McKinley and served on the general staff during the early part of the Filipino insurrection. He was honorably discharged from service in 1900 and recommended for a congressional medal for meritorious conduct under fire.

Mr. Kelly has been a resident of Jackson county for the past five years, and has been active in politics as well as professional circles.

### CONFESSES TO ROBBING MANSION OF JEWELRY

MISSOULA, Mont., March 5.—Robert Burke today made a full written confession of having, on the night of February 3, robbed the Thatcher residence at Pueblo, Colo., of \$11,000 in precious stones and jewelry. Burke was arrested here February 26 on suspicion, following the arrest in Butte of a Missoula man named Felix Sorbets, who was taken in charge while attempting to dispose of some diamonds in a saloon. Sorbets, who is in jail at Butte, told Sheriff Kelley of Missoula that he obtained the stones, valued at nearly \$3000, from Burke, who arrived in Missoula on February 24.

In his confession Burke admits having been the sole perpetrator of the robbery. Four days later he was arrested in Denver, but had cached all the valuables except a gold jewelry case containing about \$2000 worth of gems. This package he dropped at the feet of the arresting officer, the act escaping notice.

Burke reached Missoula with but \$3000 in jewelry, and most of this he gave to Sorbets to dispose of.

**BRING SAN QUENTIN CONVICT TO COUNTY JAIL SHACKLED**

SAN RAFAEL, Cal., March 5.—Heavily guarded, Edward Delehan, the giant negro convict who killed William Kaufman, a fellow prisoner in the breakfast line in San Quentin, was brought here from the prison today and placed shackled in the county jail.

It was intended to arraign him today on the charge of murder, for which he was indicted last week, but the arraignment was put over until tomorrow.

**Jailbirds Build Jail.**

PORTLAND, Ore., March 5.—Armed with tools provided by their jailers, a score of prisoners in the city jail today tore down the bars. Then they carried them to another site where they are building another jail to confine themselves.

PINEHURST, N. C., March 5.—The eighth annual spring golf tournament at the Pinehurst Country club opened today with an entry list that promises some keen competitors. The play will continue until the end of the week.
