RUEF IS TAKEN BACK TO PRISON

SAN FRANCISCO, March 6.—Discouraged over his failure to have the indictments standing against him wiped off the slate, Abe Ruef, former political boss of San Francisco, will be returned to San Quentin prison late today to serve out his four-year sentence for bribery.

Today, March 6, is a date that bears a fateful connection with Ruef's life. Five years ago today Ruef was arrested on the charges which finally resulted in his conviction. On March 6, 1910, his sister died of a broken heart, it is said. One year ago today he began his fourteen year sentence and now he goes back to prison on the selfsame day to start in again after having been in San Francisco for several weeks as a witness in the Schmitz case.

Much sympathy was expressed today by reason of the acquittal of former Mayor Eugene E. Schmitz.

POLICE CHARGE STRIKERS AGAIN

LAWRENCE, Mass., March 6.—Renewing their "physical force" tactics with the textile strikers here, police and militiamen charged a crowd of picketers at the Arlington mills today and arrested ten women and five men on charges of intimidation and assault. The strikers assert that the charge was unwarranted, claiming that the picketers were only trying to induce workers not to return to the mills until granted the 15 per cent increase.

The police allege that some of the strikers carried bags of red pepper and feared they would attempt to blind the workers who wished to take advantage of the five per cent increase offered by the mill owners. More men are at work in the mills today than at any time since the strike started. Mill owners assert that the backbone of the strike is broken, but the strikers declare that 12,000 operatives are still out.
