Elliott, state forester, was read, stating that during the past summer this club invited the state board of forestry to hold one of their meetings at Medford, and that said invitation had been accepted, and that the board would convene at Medford on the afternoon of the 15th of March, at which time there will be present Governor West and other officers and gentlemen interested in the sub-

ject of forest protection. On motion the following committee was appointed to arrange for the reception, entertainment, etc., of the board: M. L. Erickson, Edgar Hafer and Gex L. Davis.

**Prizes for Orchardists.**  
E. R. Hall, an orchardist, advanced the idea that the club should offer prizes for the best kept orchards situated anywhere in Rogue river valley, provided, however, that no prize shall be paid to any orchardist unless he is a member of the Medford Commercial club. **T**HE fourteen inquiries that had reference to the eyes and the wearing of glasses will furnish material for several rather long talks. It will be necessary to bear in mind that eyes are like backs, legs, stomachs and hearts in that they are not all alike and are not all equal to the same amount of work.

Eye strain is a condition brought about by the abuse of the eyes, by using them excessively in poor light for close work; in other words by straining the muscles of accommodation. A far sighted, near sighted or astigmatic eye will cause the symptoms of eye strain much quicker than a normal eye. Prominent among the symptoms of eye strain is the "frontal headache" that some one asked about, this with the periodical "sick headache" and the less common occipital headache are the most common headaches due to eye strain. Car sickness and distress following an evening at the moving picture show are signs that the eyes are being mistreated, and should receive attention. The wearing of glasses by young people when needed to relieve eye strain means that the next generation will have better eyes than the present, our eyes are as good or better than those of our grandparents but we do more near work of all kinds and consequently have to have glasses if we wish to be comfortable while reading, sewing, etc. Our grandchildren will have better eyes than we.
