

FATHER ATTEMPTS TO SECURE CHILD

An exciting affray following an attempt by an irate father, whose identity could not be learned, Saturday morning at the Southern Pacific depot to recover possession of a child. The mother and bystanders succeeded in blocking the efforts of the man and shortly afterwards the two had evidently vanished into thin air in the neighborhood of Beatty street on North Central.

Seeing her husband from whom she is separated, in the crowd, she ran to a dray and jumping in, commanded the driver to whip up his horses and get away. The husband and father, however, reached her and was attempting to gain possession of the child by force, when bystanders, led by E. A. F. Bitter, interfered and the woman got away.

On reaching Beatty street the woman left the dray. The driver noticed the man running down Central avenue. He notified the police but nothing has been found of the couple for they had vanished by the time the police had reached the scene.
