That the dry season in southern California will drive hundreds of easterners taking advantage of the colonist rates to come to California to Oregon in search of homes is the belief of Harry J. Neely of Medford and Spokane, who arrived in Medford Sunday from southern California, where he spent several weeks. Mr. Neely says there is absolutely no comparison between the places he has visited and the Rogue river valley.

"The season has been very dry," states Mr. Neely, "and while recent rains assure a crop of hay the fruit—especially oranges and lemons—has suffered heavily. Many young trees have died. This condition will drive hundreds of easterners north. They are arriving in southern California by the thousands and conditions there are so discouraging that they will leave for the north."

SUGAR TRUST PLACED ON TRIAL

NEW YORK, March 11.—After many months of delay the trial of the sugar trust officials, charged with crushing the Pennsylvania sugar refining company out of existence started today before United States Judge Hand. The trial is expected to drag along for weeks as the sugar trust attorneys are expected to take advantage of all the technicalities. The defendants in the case are Washington Thomas, president of the American Sugar Refining company; John Parsons, former legal director for the trust; Arthur Donner and George Frazier, trust directors, and Thomas Harned, a Philadelphia lawyer. The accused officials were indicted June 19, 1909. Adolph Regel, one of the trust's alleged victims, will be the government's chief witness.
