

### WALTER PARSONS MARRIED AGAIN

Walter H. Parsons, who is remembered here as being formerly employed at the Blue Ledge mine, and as the promoter of the Blue Ledge telephone line, and afterwards as mining engineer and broker, has been married at San Francisco to Miss Teresa Eaton of Vancouver, B. C.

Mr. Parsons left here four years ago. At that time he was married to an Ashland girl and the couple had a child. Just before he left here the house they resided in on Riverside avenue was destroyed by fire. He left here for British Columbia and a year or two later visited a few days in Medford.

The following account of his marriage is taken from a recent issue of the Examiner:

#### Examiner's Account

Walter H. Parsons, an Oakland mining man, who has large interests in Colombia, and Miss Teresa Eaton of Vancouver, B. C., daughter of A. E. Eaton, a real estate man, will be married at St. Mark's hotel in Oakland tonight.

Tomorrow morning they will leave on the Overland Limited for New York. From there they will go to South America, returning to San Francisco by way of the Pacific ocean.

Parsons, who has just returned from Colombia with a fortune, says that Colombia is no place for a poor mining man. He found it necessary to invest large sums of money in machinery in order to secure returns from his placer holdings. The machinery is being made in San Francisco and as soon as it is ready he and his bride will go to Colombia to remain five or six years.

#### Talks of Colombia

"It is useless to start any boom talk about Colombia," said Parsons at the Palace hotel last night. "I have been all through the South American countries and my observation is that a poor man will come near starving there. I heard of one miner who was lucky. He began to dig among the graves of Indians and found a platter of solid gold, two inches thick, with Masonic symbols engraved on it. The plate was thousands of years old, it is believed, and weighed \$62,000 worth of gold. I understand it was sold to the first order of Masons in this country for a large sum. Another man found a valuable picture in one of the old churches down there, but gold mines are hard to locate. There is practically no quartz mining.

"I have been interested in the study of American trade in South America. There is hardly any to speak of, and the trouble is entirely due to the American manufacturers. They will not cater to the trade there. They try to tell the people what they want, instead of finding out what they need. The result is that the Germans and English get all the trade."

### LE BRUN HERE NEXT TUESDAY

Over five thousand dollars are invested in the costumes and scenery used by the Le Brun company which is to appear here soon in a program of grand opera. One of the gowns which Madame La Brun wears is completely covered with solid silver spangles, imported from Paris and cost \$500, which will be seen at the Medford theatre March 12.

The costume used by Mr. Huttman in "Manrico" in "Il Trovatore" weighs forty pounds. Every piece of metal is gold washed including the helmet and the sword scabbard. The cloth in this costume is a heavy quality of satin, embroidered with gold lace. The hauberk, outside of its gold metal trimming, is made of solid cloth of gold.

Miss Baer's gown used in "Il Trovatore" is made of robin egg blue tulle, embroidered in gold laurel wreaths, trimmed in ropes of pearls.

One of Mr. Deane's costumes is a scarlet velvet and satin, embroidered in gold. The boots for this suit are made of suede leather and dyed the color of the costume by Capozio— noted theatrical shoe maker.

The swords used were made especially for this company of Damascus steel. Mr. Deane and Mr. Huttman are both proud of these swords and often double them together to the delight of sword experts.

In the production, especially of "Il Trovatore," Madame Le Brun wears several thousand dollars worth of jewels.

Special scenery is carried for everything. The scenery used for "Cavalleria Rusticana" depicts a typical Italian country village scene in the immediate vicinity of where the story actually took place. The picture was brought over by Mr. Huttman and he used this painting as the original of the drop-curtain in this act.

#### FORMER INSANE PATIENT SHOWS UP AT ASYLUM

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 11.—After nine years' freedom following his escape from the state asylum for the insane at Mendocino, a man suddenly presented himself at the door of that institution the other day and asked that he be taken back.

### WEEK'S PRICES IN LIVESTOCK

PORTLAND, Ore., March 11.—Receipts for the week were: Cattle 1932, calves 49, hogs 2555, sheep 5106, horses 33.

The cattle market during the week was characterized by dullness without a serious break in prices as compared with the sales of the week before. The butchers and packers have loaded up quite heavily and did not show a great amount of eagerness for added purchases, but competition maintained a fairly steady level of prices. Butcher stuff sold strongly and the demand for cows was not met.

The hog market was steady to strong. There was one lot of choice lightweight hogs from the Des Moines country that brought \$6.95. They averaged 147 pounds, and sold at this exceedingly good price because of a demand for hogs of that weight and smoothness.

The sheep market was also steady to strong. One lot of lambs, weighing 78 pounds, sold at \$6.25. Sheared wethers sold at \$4.20, while a lot of 250 ewes that were not sheared sold at \$4.65.

Entries for the Pacific Northwest Live Stock show indicate a splendid display of pure bred and fat animals. A big excursion will arrive from Lewiston and the Inland Empire on March 18 and in point of attendance this show will surpass anything of this character that has ever been held west of the Rocky mountains. ### TAFT CLAIMS TO BE PROGRESSIVE

CHICAGO, March 11.—President Taft Saturday gave a new definition to the "political progressive" in a speech at a banquet of the Swedish-American Republican league of Chicago. He eliminated from consideration as real progressives those who look to socialism for relief from the present-day evils of government, declared that his "distinguished predecessor" had most of the credit for awakening the public to the need of action and urged that "progressive is that progressive does."

Pointing to some of the achievements of his administration as proof that it has qualified under that definition he said: "The term 'progressive' includes all those who have been moved in the efforts of reform by the necessity for legislative and governmental action to deprive corporate capital and undue vested privilege of its political power and to bring about proper popular and governmental control and regulation of the use of capital in legitimate avenues and for legitimate purposes."
