ROGERS GUILTY OF FIRST DEGREE MURDER

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—John S. Rogers is awaiting sentence for killing Benjamin Goodman, the jury having found him guilty of murder in the first degree. As the jury made no recommendation for life imprisonment, the way is open for a death sentence for the murderer, Rogers on November 18, killed Goodman, a jewelry salesman, in the basement of a wholesale produce company and robbed him of \$5,000 worth of jewels. Judge Willis of Los Angeles set March 16 as the day for passing sentence.

COWLEY ELECTED MAYOR CITY OF CENTRAL POINT

At the city election held in Central Point Monday, W. A. Cowley was elected mayor and J. O. Isaacson treasurer, both two-year terms, without opposition. Little interest was manifested in the day, and the election passed off quietly. The mayor-elect has been a resident of Central Point for about two years. He is a large property holder and is senior member of the Rogue River Hardware & Plumbing company. He is also president of the Central Point Y. M. C. A., and was instrumental in its organization. Previous to locating in southern Oregon he resided in Concord, N. H., where he served as alderman and city recorder.

RAILROAD COMMISSION CONSIDERS THE CANAL

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—The railroad commission today announces an open meeting here on Friday, March 15, for the purpose of considering the Panama canal bill, now pending before congress. The questions of tolls and whether or not steamship lines, owned and controlled by railroad companies, shall be permitted to engage in coastwise trade via the canal, will be given special consideration.

PORTLAND, March 12.—Because he has interfered with the local Chinese tong war and attempted to end it, various warring factions in Chinatown have got together and decided to assassinate Chief of Police Slaver according to information given Slaver today.

"I will not tell where I got my information," said Slaver, "but I want to say that 'No Chinamen are going to run Portland or the police department."

"I will issue orders for patrolmen to go after tongmen doubly hard now and the Oriental will learn that threats don't stop us."

A few days ago fifty Chinese were rounded up on vagrancy charges because the rival tongs declined to sign a peace pact.

CLOSING ARGUMENTS IN THURSTON WILL CASE

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 12.—State Senator Wright, chief counsel for Katherine Tingley, defendant in the Thurston will suit, in which George L. Patterson seeks to have his mother's will set aside because she left the bulk of her fortune to the Theosophist leader, started his argument to the jury today. Judge E. T. Smith, another of Mrs. Tingley's lawyers, completed his argument by scoring George L. Patterson for drinking intoxicating liquors and for continually making trouble in his family.
