# CITY LICENSE LAW IS PASSED

The city council held a meeting Tuesday afternoon at the city hall and discussed many items of interest. A license ordinance was passed, a new city hall sidetracked and the building for a public market discussed.

The license ordinance classifies nearly every profession or business and fixes a license, if any, for the same.

The object of the ordinance as passed is to protect the people of the city from fake sales and swindle games, also to provide the amounts to be collected from licensees, vendors and all agents that may have goods to offer to the public.

The old ordinance was repealed some weeks ago, it being found that it was not valid in that the fines that could be imposed upon the offender were more than it was lawful for the council to mete out. In the new ordinance the maximum fine for any violation is \$100 instead of \$200.

Licenses were fixed for draymen, auctioneers, itinerant merchants that conducted gift or fire sales, and all peddlers other than those that disposed of agricultural products.

The ordinance will be effective March 23 and will take precedence over all other licenses issued under the old ordinance.

A resolution asking the council to repeal the fire ordinance passed at the last meeting of the council was presented to the council as the result of a meeting of the firemen held Wednesday night, at which time the firemen appointed a committee to draft the resolution to be presented to the council.

The changes that are prayed in the resolution are that the ordinance place the firemen on a graduated scale and that the chief shall receive \$100 per month, assistant chief and driver \$85 per month and the three firemen \$75 per month. The amounts as named in the ordinance passed at the last council meeting was: Chief \$85, assistant \$75 and firemen \$65.

The building committee was instructed by the council to consider ways and means for the construction of the public market and to present

where in the neighborhood of \$1800. The building as planned is to be 100 by 40 feet and will have a concrete floor.

Inasmuch as there had been no levy made for that purpose, the council decided that they would not at this time be able to erect a city hall.

All the members of the council were of the opinion that the city needed such a building that they would furnish adequate room for all the city officials, but in view of the fact that there had been no provision made for the erection of the building and not wishing to place an extra burden on the taxpayers, they decided that for this year nothing should be done. The matter was not put to a vote, but it was a general understanding that the matter was dropped unless they could find some means other than those that now presented themselves for the raising of the money

necessary to the erection of the building.
