## MINING MEN USE NEW MINING CLUB

## MULKEY MAY HAVE TO PLAY DETECTIVE

Because he was zealous in the performance of his duty, Prosecuting Attorney R. F. Mulkey is loser \$370 in good gold coin, besides the work he put into the conviction of the bootleggers of Josephine county.

When Robert Smith became the mayor of Grants Pass Mulkey saw an opportunity of aid in his fight of the blind-piggers and he at once launched the fight. A detective was hired and plans were made, all of which cost money. When the time came for trial a large number were convicted and the fines of \$1800 were imposed by the court. Part of these were paid, while others were confined to the county jail.

At the regular meeting of the county court only the bills for the witnesses and mileage were allowed and Prosecutor Mulkey was left with a detective bill to pay and all other incidentals that had accumulated by the procuring of evidence.

## MAN REGISTERS AS MEMER POPULIST PARTY

Somewhere in Jackson county there lives a populist who is not ashamed to place his name as such on the registration book, notwithstanding that by so doing he loses his ballot at the primary election.

Thursday night at 5 o'clock the total registration was 2456. Of this number over half, 1549, of the entire number were republicans. Democrats were second with 661, socialists took third with 124, independents 75, prohibitionists 31, 35 who were without any party affiliations and 1 populist.

## VANCOUVER TROOPS SENT TO HONOLULU

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 15.—The entire first infantry, now stationed at Vancouver Barracks, and consisting of about thirty-five officers and families and 900 enlisted men, will sail from Portland, Or., on May 7 or 8, on the transport Sheridan, direct to Honolulu, according to war department orders. The personal effects and belongings of the regiment will be loaded into barges at the government dock about May 5 and sent to Portland, there to be re-loaded onto the Sheridan.

## WILSON TO LOOK ORCHARDS OVER

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., March 15.—On Wednesday, March 29, Prof. W. F. Wilson of the entomology department of the Oregon Agricultural college will go to Astoria, accompanied by A. C. Goodrich of Yamhill, horticultural commissioner of the first district, to address a series of meetings of the fruit growers and vegetable gardeners of the vicinity. They will also investigate the insect pests of the neighborhood.

Prof. Wilson will later make an investigation of methods of combating the codling moth in southern Oregon and other districts. Two or three weeks after the early spray has been applied to the apple tree to kill this pest, he will go through the district, when the petals have fallen.

## Far Sight, Near Sight, Astigmatism

It is impossible to give a long description of these errors in the space at our disposal, but we will hit the high places.

Far sight is a condition in which the eye at rest cannot see distant objects clearly. In order to see clearly a certain amount of strain is unconsciously placed upon the muscle of accommodation this amount of strain or muscular effort must be increased when near objects are to be looked at. This sort of trouble of low degree may cause no discomfort of any sort for years, particularly if the eyes are not used a great deal for near work, but near work and increasing age will bring the trouble out at last and then there may be a great deal of difficulty in correcting what would have been a simple matter earlier in life.

Near sight is just the opposite of far sight, with some additions and many differences. While far sight as a rule is stationary after ten years of age, near sight may be progressive, growing worse with greater or less rapidity and in a few instances leading to very poor vision even to blindness; this fact has caused some of the French oculists to class near sight as a disease rather than a refractive error. In this condition distant vision is very poor, while by bringing the work near to the eye the near vision is very good. If untreated this condition is very likely to grow worse, but it may at any time be benefited by properly fitted glasses if there has been no destruction of the delicate structures within the eye. Astigmatism is a condition of unequal curvature of the cornea (front part of the eye) or lens. That is: instead of being a segment of a perfect sphere it is a segment of an egg shaped body. This produces according to degree the most distressing symptoms of eye strain but with carefully adjusted lenses these may be relieved. All of these conditions are found in the same eyes, so careful examination is an absolute essential to obtaining relief.

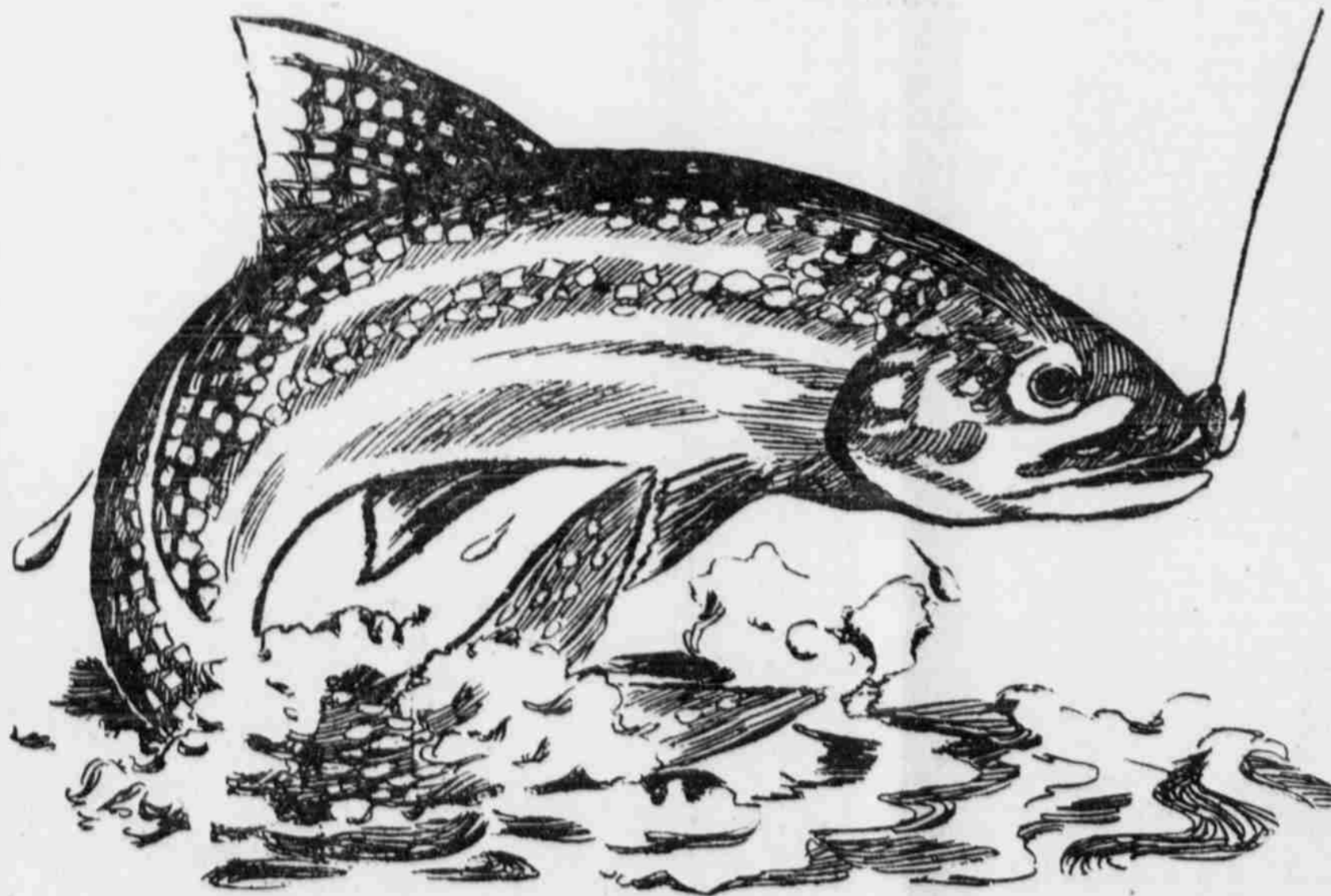

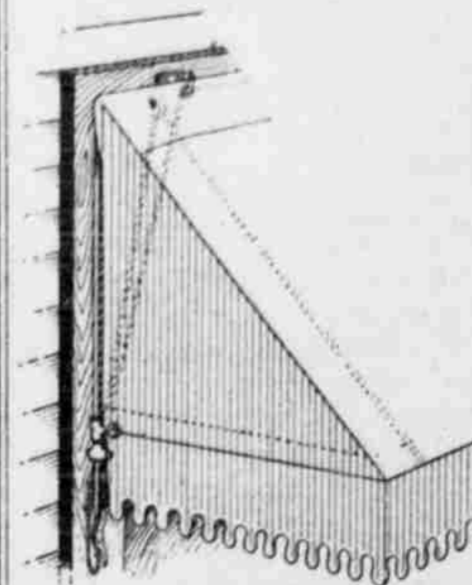
