## GERMANY LAUNCHES NEW DREADNAUGHT

DANZIG, Germany, March 16.—In the presence of Emperor William, King Albert of Saxony, and a large number of high navy and army officials the new battleship "King Albert" was launched here today. With the launching Germany has added another dreadnaught to her navy to which England will reply with two. The King Albert when completed will cost about \$11,500,000.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 16.—Dispatches received here today from Italaanak say that forty-five persons were killed there by a coal mine explosion today.

## THINK ATTEMPT ON KING WELL PLANNED

ROME, March 16.—Although positive evidence is lacking, the authorities today believe the attempt on the

life of King Victor Emmanuel was the result of a long arranged plot well financed.

The Italian ambassador in Berlin notified the government here that a German had informed the embassy that he had overheard a conversation of three men who said they would leave Berlin for Italy in March and attempt to assassinate the king from a window. They were to receive \$20,000 if successful. Leading anarchists say A'Alba is unknown to them and they condemn the outrage.

**Buoys Travel Far.**  
WASHINGTON, March 16.—As an instance of the distance to which buoys have traveled after being dislodged from station, information has been received by the bureau of light-houses, department of commerce and labor, that a conical iron buoy belonging to the United States light-house service has been found about three miles off Cape Lear, Ireland.

In 1908 a United States lighthouse service buoy was found floating on Murrigh strand, county Clare, Ireland, and a whistling buoy belonging off the coast of California was recently picked up by a lighthouse tender off Hana, Maui, T. H.

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## STATE TO TAKE UP FORESTRY WORK

SALEM, Ore., March 16.—By an agreement just reached between H. S. Graves, national forester and State Forester Elliott, many branches of the forestry work heretofore conducted by the federal government, will be turned over to the state forestry department.

As a result it is believed the developments of forestry conditions in Oregon will be materially enhanced, reforestation will be promoted more rapidly and closer protection of timber lands will be brought about.

## BAR RAILROADS FROM PANAMA CANAL ZONE

WASHINGTON, March 16.—An amendment to the Panama canal government bill, which would bar from the canal all railroads which owned ships engaged in the coastwise trade was agreed upon today by the house committee on interstate and foreign commerce. The committee had announced an agreement on the bill that would prohibit only such railroads as owned vessels using the canal as could be proved to be operating in restraint of trade or stifling competition.

The amendment was urged by Representative Covington of Maryland.

and would prohibit the use of the canal to any railroad or other common carrier owning or controlling, directly or indirectly, a steamship line with which it does or might compete. Another section would prevent the use of the canal by railroads which absorb water lines.

The spirited fight between Governor Donaghey of Arkansas, who is seeking a third nomination, and Congressman Joe T. Robinson, who is opposing him, will end with the democratic state primaries on March 27.
