DIRIGIBLE BALLOON BOMB KILLS FOUR NON-FIGHTERS

LONDON, March 22.—Four persons were killed and 19 wounded, all non-combatants, in the town of Zanzur, near Tripoli, by a bomb dropped from an Italian dirigible balloon, according to dispatches received here from a correspondent with the Turkish army. Heavy rifle fire from the Turkish infantry put the dirigible to rout.
