

### FAST CURIST TO TRY STARVATION

SEATTLE, March 22.—Dr. Linda Borfield Hazzard, the fast cure specialist who was recently convicted of manslaughter for the death of one of her patients, Claire Williamson, will undertake an absolute fast next Tuesday morning that will continue at least thirty days and may go beyond forty days.

Mrs. Hazzard claims that her poor health resulting from the enormous strain of her trial, absolutely requires such a fast at this time. She only reserves the right to use water and the benefit of plenty of fresh air. Dr. Hazzard during the past month offered to let the King County Medical association and three experts who testified against her to choose a committee to observe her fast and place such restrictions as would guarantee it as absolute bona fide but her offer has not been accepted.

### WEST MAY ISSUE PAROLE TO MORRIS

SALEM, Ore., March 22.—Governor West today declared he was favorably inclined toward the application for parole of Cashier W. Cooper Morris, convicted of misuse of the funds of the wrecked Oregon Trust & Savings bank, now in the Oregon penitentiary. He stated that he had referred the application to the parole board and that if that body recommended parole he would give Morris' case as much consideration as any.

The governor declared that the outcome of the trials following the wrecking of the bank was a rank miscarriage of justice. He said that if Morris had had the wealth and influence of others against whom similar charges were made he would not be serving time.

### FIFTY-TWO CORPSES RECOVERED FROM MINE

McCURTAIN, Okla., March 22.—Fifty-two is the total of corpses removed from the burning mine of the San Bois Coal company today. Thirty other bodies have been located in the mine, and 25 miners were rescued alive, making a total of 167 of the entombed men accounted for.

Funerals of twenty-five of twenty-five of the victims were held here today.

### ROOSEVELT'S PETITIONS FILED FOR CALIFORNIA

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 22.—With the filing of all the Roosevelt petitions with the exception of that from Los Angeles, the colonel's friends today claimed first place on the republican ballot. Not one of the Taft nomination petitions has yet been filed. La Follette petitions also are as yet to be heard from.

Woodrow Wilson will run close to Roosevelt in the time of complete nomination. His petitions will be all on file by tonight. Only one Clark petition has been received.

### ALUMINUM TRUST AGREES TO VOLUNTARILY DISSOLVE

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The aluminum trust today completed negotiations with the department of justice by which it will voluntarily disintegrate. It has plants in New York, Pennsylvania and Canada.

### Kahn Off for Europe.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Congressman Julius Kahn of California expects to leave tomorrow for a month's rest and visit at one of the European resorts. His health has been poor of late.

### INDIANAPOLIS, March 22.—Governor Thomas R. Marshall of Indiana, temporary chairman of the Indiana state democratic convention, in his address urged democrats to go this year to the people upon a platform of the cardinal principle of which is opposition to special privilege.

Governor Marshall said in part: "With republican quarrels and controversies we have nothing to do. We dare not rely upon the weakness of our opposition and it would be cowardly to do so did we dare. Sixty years is but a point in the circle of civilization, yet the last sixty have produced two men whose views will leave an impress upon all time. No liberty lover will ever care to forget the name of Lincoln and none will be able to forget the name of Roosevelt."

### BANK ROBBER OFFERS \$2000 CASH BRIBES

LOS ANGELES, Cal., March 22.—Charles Dean, alias "Hoffman," held on a charge of having assisted in the robbery of more than a quarter of a million dollars from the New Westminster (B. C.) branch of the Bank of Montreal, offered cash in blocks of \$2000 to be permitted to escape from the county jail here, according to Turnkey Oscar Norrell. Dean, Norrell declared, offered him \$2000 to aid his escape, stating that similar amounts would be given to all who helped.

### SEND DELEGATION TO EUROPE FOR FAIR

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The Pacific Coast congressional delegation today is in consultation with President Taft as to the personnel of a committee which will go to Europe to boom the 1915 Panama exposition in San Francisco.

The president probably will appoint one army and one navy man, two diplomats, two government officials and other prominent men to represent the fair abroad. Their expenses will be paid by the Panama-Pacific exposition company.

### FOURTEEN PASSENGERS INJURED IN WRECK

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., March 22.—Fourteen passengers were seriously hurt today when four coaches of the second section of the Vancouver Express of the Canadian Pacific railway left the rails at Jackfish, north of Lake Superior, and rolled down an embankment.

The injured passengers were taken to a hospital at Port Arthur. A broken rail caused the accident.

### PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY BILL FOR NEBRASKA

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 22.—The house District of Columbia committee today heard Congressman Norris of Nebraska discuss his bill for a presidential primary in the district. Congressman Hughes of New Jersey, who represented the Wilson adherents, said they favored such a primary.

### FIERCE BATTLE WITH REBELS IN PARAGUAY

ASUNCION, Paraguay, March 22.—Revolutionary and government forces are engaged in a fierce conflict near this city today. The fighting continues about equal, with heavy losses on both sides. A number of entrenched points have been taken and re-taken.

The trouble has been going on since the failure of the proposed peace pact on March 16, and the outcome is uncertain of prediction.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 22.—John W. Noble, aged 80, a veteran of the civil war and secretary of the interior in the administration of President Benjamin Harrison, died at his home here this afternoon.
